Alaska Airbase to Continue for Year

Washington (P)—The air base at Shemya Island, on Alaska's Aleutian chain, will remain in operation for at least a year, Sen. Jackson (D. Wn.) said Thursday.

He said he was advised by F. B. Lee, civil aeronautics administrator, that the CAA is making arrangements with the Air Force to continue operations of the base until July 1, 1954.

Saigon, Indochina (P)—The French said Thursday they inflicted 600 casualties on the Communist-led Vietminh and chased them out of a series of fortified villages on the central Indochina coast.

Although the bulk of the enemy force — estimated to number 3,000 — had escaped, a military command spokesman called the operation, launched by air and sea on Tuesday, a success.
