Now Dior Says No Corsets

Paris (AP)—Christian Dior says that in all the fuss over his shortened skirts an important subject has been overlooked. He's done away with corsets. "For the first time I have done away with corsets, even for dance dresses," he said in an article for the Paris Presse, an afternoon newspaper. "I have often heard men complain, that in dancing, they couldn't feel a living form under women's corsets." Dior's shortened skirts caused a sensation in fashion circles last week. He told the Paris newspaper women were already beginning to shorten their hemlines before he decided last May to shorten skirts this fall. "Revolution was in the air," he said. "I noticed in the streets that women were slyly beginning to shorten their hems." He guarded his secret by leaving his new creations unhemmed until the last moment.

(3) No foreign foliage is permitted in specimen entries, stems should be long. Self foliage must be in specimen entries. (4) No more than five blooms are allowed in specimen entries unless showing buds. (5) Judging will be at 12 noon, August 8. (6) No container will be necessary for specimen display, containers will be provided. (7) Flower show is limited to amateur growers and local commercial growers with the understanding that the commercial displays will not be judged in competition. (8) Only judges and flower show officials will be allowed at the show between 11 a.m. and 2:30 o'clock p.m. (9) Any exhibitor may make one entry in each class of "Horticulture Division." One variety of any color. (Artistic arrangements are not limited. (10) All entries should be picked up at 9 a.m. Saturday, August 8. (11) The show will be opened continuously from

2:30 to 9 p.m. For a complete detailed list of instructions the several divisions those interested may phone 3-6454.

There are six main divisions, fully detailed in sections: Horticulture, artistic arrangements, junior to 15 years, potted plants, planters, and Garden clubs the theme of which is "Coronation Year."

High arrangements are 16 inches or over and low arrangements are under 15 inches.
