- Ingredients: 1 cup sifted flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 5 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1 1/4 cups blueberries (picked over, washed and drained), sugar topping.
- Method: Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Cream butter and sugar; add egg and beat thoroughly. Mix in dry ingredients alternately with milk until blended. Fold in berries. Turn into greased heat-resistant round cake dish (8 1/4 by 1 3/4 inches.)
- For Sugar Topping: Sift together 1/4 cup sifted flour, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon and 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg; cut in 2 tablespoons butter or margarine until like fine crumbs; sprinkle over blueberry batter. Bake in moderate (375 F.) oven about 35 to

### Colorado Gas Line Favored

Seattle — Governor Dan Thornton of Colorado, at the governors conference here today, said he will seek the backing of six other western governors in favor of an all-American gas pipeline from the San Juan Basin of Colorado to the Pacific Northwest.

Thornton, who said he has followed closely the hearings now in progress before the federal power commission in Washington, D. C., asserted the all-American line, which Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corporation proposes to build, "offers a much sounder basis for developing new American industry" than a proposed line which would serve the northwest from Canada.

Thornton said he plans to discuss the line with the governors of New Mexico, Wyoming, Utah, Oregon, Idaho, and Washington "because of our mutual interest and benefit." The line would pass through and serve those states.

Held as a witness in the affair is Cecelia Smith Gindron, who claims to be Smith's wife. The woman is said to have been the cause of an argument between the two men.

Albany—George Clark Price, 82, son of early Linn county pioneers, and the first paid fire department chief in Albany, died at a Lebanon nursing home Sunday following a long illness.

The funeral was held at the Fisher Funeral home at 11 a.m. Tuesday. Burial will take place in the Albany Masonic cemetery.

He held the position of fire chief for many years and retired in 1921.

He was born on the donation land claim of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nimrod Price, who came here from Kentucky in 1849 and settled in what is now the Price school district. Mr. Price had spent all of his life at and near Albany.

On Feb. 27, 1895, at Albany, Mr. Price married Amanda Minnie Voss, who died in 1930. On Jan. 12, 1931, also at Albany, he married Nellie Kenney Fisher, who survives. Surviving also are five stepchildren, children of Mrs. Fisher. They are Raymond, Harold and Floyd, of Albany; Mrs. H. H. Beeson, Otis and Mrs. Thomas Meagher, Grand Forks, N. D.
