By CARL LUNDQUIST New York (AP) — The Dodgers made it an anniversary walk.

Never forgetting for a moment that it was exactly two years ago they started the memorable collapse which saw them blow the 13 1/2 game lead they possessed on Aug. 11 of that season, they just about convinced every one in sight that it won't happen again—at least not this year.

Erskine Two-Hitter Carl Erskine pitched a two-hitter, missing a no-hitter only because of two singles by Hank Thompson. It was the first victory of his life in the Polo grounds after five straight defeats there, 13th of the season. In fact it was the only complete game he ever pitched there.

Sal Maglie got his ears nailed to his head, permitting nine hits in four innings, including Gil Hodges 25th homer of the year and his first against Giant pitching, Maglie, who had a 3-0 won and lost edge over Brooklyn this year, and who had been 18-5 lifetime before last night's defeat, begged off in the fifth inning because of a stiff right shoulder.

The Dodgers finally evened the season count with the Giants at 7-7. They are ahead of all other clubs in season's play.

Bums Boost Lead Brooklyn's lead went to 7 1/2 games when the Cardinals, on doubles by Solly Hemus and Red Schoendienst in the ninth inning, drove in the winning run in a 4-3 victory at Milwaukee, which ended the six-game winning streak of the second-place Braves. Stu Miller pitched a seven-hitter for his third victory over Milwaukee. Stan Musial and Rip Repulski homered for St. Louis and Del Crandall hit one for Milwaukee.

The White Sox cut the Yankee lead to six games in the American League by defeating collapsible Cleveland, 6-2, while Washington upset New York, 2-1.

In other American League games the Red Sox won a pair at Philadelphia, 7-6 and 7-5, while St. Louis beat Detroit 5-2, then lost 9-3. Elsewhere in the National Pittsburgh completed a suspended game victory over the Phillies, 7-4, then lost the regular contest, 3-0, while the Cubs topped Cincinnati 1-0.

Duck Hunters Get Five Additional Days Some Spots

Washington, (AP)—New migratory waterfowl regulations prepared by the Interior Department grant five additional hunting days to duck hunters in the Atlantic and Pacific flyways, Secretary of the Interior McKay said Monday.

McKay said the extra hunting time authorized in basic 1953-54 regulations "represents an attempt to alleviate an acute degradation problem on both grain-raising and grazing areas."

The new regulations leave it to individual states to select specific hunting dates. McKay said they will be generally between Oct. 1 and Jan. 10, according to the number of days allowed flyways in which the states lies.

The Pacific flyway, which includes Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington, will have a 75-day consecutive season or

two periods of 34 days each, McKay said. Specific dates will be announced later. One change eliminates a regulation prohibiting shooting within one-half mile of baited area.

Fish and Wildlife Service Director John L. Farley warned in an accompanying statement that dropping the provision which McKay said was controversial "is not intended to soften the law; shooting migratory birds by use of bait is still outlawed."

In all flyways under the new regulations, shooting of

ducks, geese, brant and coot will be allowed until sunset, instead of one hour before sunset. The starting time remains one-half hour before sunrise, and on opening days waterfowl and coot may not be hunted before noon.

Bag and possession limits for ducks in the Pacific flyways are increased from six to seven, plus four pintails or widgeons a day in possession singly or in combination.

Bags and possession limits for geese remain at six, but such limit shall not include more than three birds of the following dark species, common Canada, White-fronted tulle, blue or emperor goose.

The bag and possession limits for coot were raised from 15 to 25 but for brant they remain at three, with a season from Dec. 1 to Feb. 10.
