

Portland Downs Oaks 6-4; Hollies Lead by Nine Games

Portland **6-4**—The Portland Beavers batted Jim Atkins for 13 hits last night to drop Oakland, 6-4, and clinch the four-game PCL series.

Lyma Linde started the Beavers on the way to their third straight win over the Oaks, but needed the help of Red Adams in the eighth. It was Linde's 10th win against nine losses, while Atkins came out with a 6-12 record.

A homer in the second frame by Bob Marquis and another in the fourth by Aaron Robinson got the Beavers off to an early start. Fletcher Robbe added another run in the third by doubling in Hank Art.

Robbe batted in his second run in the fifth when Frankie Austin scored on his single. In the seventh, Art singled, Robbe doubled and Atkins gave Robinson an intentional walk to load the bases and set up Portland's final two runs. Herm Reich looped a single to center field to score Art and Eddie Basinski filled out, allowing Robbe to score.

Oakland made a strong scoring threat in the eighth before Linde left the mound. With two out, Davis got a double and Art Culliti a single to score two runs. That ended Linde and Adams struck out Johnny Berry to retire the side.

NCAA Swings Into Vital Summer Meet

Chicago (AP)—Is Michigan State one of the "unholy three" colleges facing disciplinary action this week-end by the NCAA's hard-boiled council? This was the big question in hotel lobbies Thursday as the National Collegiate Athletic Association's various committees swung into a series of important mid-summer meetings.

The NCAA has announced the council will act this week-end, possibly Saturday or Sunday, on a report of the membership committee citing three unidentified institutions for alleged violations of the athletic code.

Arizona State at Tempe is said to be a second under scrutiny while the third remained a mystery. The NCAA brass wasn't telling anything.

Michigan State, which produced the No. 1 football team in the country last year, is reported on thin ice because of practices which already has drawn the censure of the Big Ten Conference.

The Big Ten placed the Spartans on probation until they could produce details of a foundation set up by alumni to bring talent to the university.

Arizona State also is being investigated because of recruiting practices.
