Frozen Apricot Cream
Ingredients: 1 cup apricot fruit nectar, 20 marshmallows, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup cream.
Method: Heat nectar and marshmallows over simmering water until marshmallows are melted; cover and stir occasionally. Remove from heat; add salt and lemon juice; cool. Whip cream and fold in. Pour into refrigerator tray; place in freezing compartment with control set at lowest temperature; freeze without stirring. When firm, reset temperature control to normal. Makes about 6 servings.
