Salem, Butte Play At 8 O'Clock Sunday Night

Salem's American Legion junior baseball team leaves Salem by train at 6:30 tonight, bound for Yakima, Wash., and the Northwest regional tournament.
Salem opens defense of its Northwest championship in an 8 o'clock game against Butte, Mont., at Parker field in Yakima Sunday. Yakima and Lewiston, Idaho, clash in a 2 o'clock game Sunday.
Coach Vince Genna and his Salem Legions carry a record of 23 wins and 0 losses with them to Yakima. The 23 wins were piled up during the regular season play, exhibition games, inter-district playoffs and the state tournament.
The Yakima tournament runs Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Winner of the double-elimination affair will enter the section D playoffs at Hastings, Neb., beginning August 23.
Salem went to Hastings last year, and won one game there before being eliminated.
Genna has not named a starting pitcher for the game against Butte Sunday. "It all depends on which pitcher feels the best after we get to Yakima," explains Genna. There are four pitchers on the Salem roster—Gary Espe, Paul Beck, Gary Paterson and Ed Warburg.
Others players making the trip to Yakima are catchers Curt Janine and Dan Luby; first baseman Tom Fickens; second baseman Mink Pederson; shortstop Don Figley; third baseman Larry Springer; outfielders Jerry Waldrop, Mike Campbell, Jerry Gregg and Howard Spear; and utility man Fred Bolton.

Senators to Keep 100% of Receipts From Next Series

When the Salem Senators and Tri-City Braves play their series at Waters park Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights, the Senators will keep 100 percent of the gate receipts.
This was arranged by business officials of the two clubs this week. Tri-City, in turn, will keep 100 per cent of the gate receipts in a series at Tri-City, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.
Ordinarily, the visiting team takes home 40 per cent of the gate receipts from each series.
In previous series between Salem and Tri-City this season, the Senators have drawn many more fans than has Tri-City.
Whenever Salem goes to Tri-City, the Senators bring home a small check. But when Tri-City comes to Salem, the Braves take home a big check.
Salem general manager Hugh Luby, president Bruce Williams and business manager Deke Walker thus were encouraged to make arrangements with the Tri-City club for the home-team-keep-all arrangement.
A special night will be included in the series here. That is Wednesday, when a television set will be awarded to some fan.

Salem Game Postponed; Nicholas Seeks 20th Win

Victoria, B. C.—The scheduled Western International league baseball game between the Victoria Tyees and the Salem Senators last night was postponed when the Tyees were held up by travel difficulties in Washington state.
The Tyees had finished a series at Yakima and were proceeding to Seattle by chartered bus, when they were delayed by a slide which blocked the main highway through the mountains.
The Victoria team arrived in Seattle too late to make connections by boat or plane to Victoria, forcing postponement of the contest.
A doubleheader has been scheduled for tonight. Joe Nicholas, Salem righthander, will pitch in one of the games, seeking his 20th victory of the season.

Calgary whipped Edmonton 10-4 in the league's only other game.
Wenatchee and Lewiston were not scheduled.
Wenatchee and Lewiston will return to action, Wenatchee opening a series with a single game at Spokane and Lewiston hosting Tri-City in a double-

header.
Yakima jumped on Pete Hernandez for ten safeties as the Bears got off to a winning start at Vancouver. Vancouver scored twice in the first inning but the Bears evened the tally in the fifth and chased in what proved to be the deciding run in the sixth on a double and two singles off Hernandez. Bob Wellman rapped out his 20th homer of the season with a man aboard to wind up the scoring in the seventh.
Spokane's Jack Spring came up with a two-hitter against Tri-City. Terry Carroll, former teammate of Spring's at Washington State College, accounted for both Tri-City safeties. He beat out a bunt in the seventh to wreck Spring's bid for a no-hitter, and singled in the ninth.
Eddie Capp scattered six Edmonson hits while striking out ten batters in racking up his sixth win for Calgary against as many losses.

New York (AP)—In the shattered wreckage which once was a pennant race, lay not only the hopes and dreams of the Giants today but the buried bubble of the inevitability of their ace relief pitcher— Hoyt Wilhelm.
As the Dodgers moved mercifully onward with a 10-inning 9-8 triumph that gave them six more victories in a row and three straight over the Giants, the most significant item was the way they "moldered" Wilhelm.
The Yankees stayed seven full games on top in the American league race when lefty Ed Lopat pitched a six-hit 6-1 victory over the Senators whom he beat for the 10th straight time. The White Sox topped the Indians, 7-3 with a four-run rally in the 10th inning to give Virgil Trucks his 15th victory. Al Rosen and Larry Doby hit Cleveland homers, Doby's coming in the ninth to tie the score and send the game into extra innings.
In other American league games, the Browns defeated Detroit 1-0, in 11 innings when Vic Wertz doubled and Vern Stephens singled off ex-Browns Ned Garver to break up a scoreless battle, while the Athletics topped Boston, 1-0

Oregon Fishing Streams Clear, Says Commish

Portland (AP)—Oregon fishing streams are clear and the state game commission reports angling fair to good in most of them, although it is poor in some, particularly in the coastal area and the northern Willamette valley.
Conditions on the upper Clackamas, in the Mt. Hood area and on the McKenzie river are fair to good and the Willamette and tributaries have been fair and the South Santiam is fair to good.
In the southwest, salmon fishing is fair at Winchester Bay. Sea-run cutthroat fishing is slow in the Umpqua, Smith and Siuslaw rivers. Trout fishing has been generally slow, too. Streams in the upper Umpqua are fair for trout.
In central Oregon, the road is open to Three Creek Lake and fishing is good. Sparks, Blue, Odell and Todd lakes have produced good catches. Fishing also is good in Irish and Taylor lakes, and on the upper Deschutes river.
Catches have been excellent in most lakes in the Willows mountains, and good catches have been reported from high lakes in the Elkhorns. The Innaha river fishing is good and the Willows and Lostine rivers have dropped and are clearing. A few steelhead have been taken in the lower John Day and Grand Ronde rivers.
