**Cancer Killed 2092 Oregonians in 1952**  
Portland (AP) — The State Board of Health reported Monday that 2,092 persons—1,150 males and 942 females—died of cancer in Oregon last year.

Nearly one fourth of the deaths, 501, were among persons 75 or older. There were 55 deaths among children under 15.

Cancer of the stomach claimed 233, of the respiratory system 200, of the breast 192, of the intestines 183, of the male genital organs 154 and leukemia, 121.
