Linn Co. 4-H Fair Lists Many Entries

Albany—With the Linn county fall 4-H club fair scheduled to start a week from today, indications are that it will be one of the largest junior stock shows ever held in the county, according to H. Joe Myers, show manager.

More than 200 entries have already been made in the 4-H department. One hundred fifty-five dairy animals and 135 head of sheep have been entered to date.

Fifty Jersey animals are entered now, with 51 beef animals and 100 swine to be shown. In two new phases of the show, canning and floriculture, there are 300 and 100 entries respectively.

Explorers Go Deep in Earth

Pierre St. Martin, France (AP)—Wire cables today hauled to safely the remaining two of three cave explorers who went deeper into the earth than man ever has before—2,395 feet.

The speleologists (cave explorers) hauled out today were Robert Levi and Norbert Casteret. Their colleague, Dr. Andre Mairey, was pulled up last night from the St. Martin Cave here in the Pyrenees Mountains of southwestern France.

Complete Road Near Aurora

Aurora—Eight and one-half miles of the Wilsonville road project have been completed between Springbrook and the Fernwood community and Yamhill county crews are continuing work that will extend the resurfacing to the Clackamas county line, connecting with the Wilsonville ferry. The finished road is "built to last," according to County Commissioner Charles Newman

and Albert Youngberg, who said that barring unseasonable freezes or unanticipated heavy trucking, the new hard rock surface, covered with heavy oil, should last 20 to 30 years.

The rock used on the road is from the Renne quarry and is used without crushing as a base for the durable road surface.
