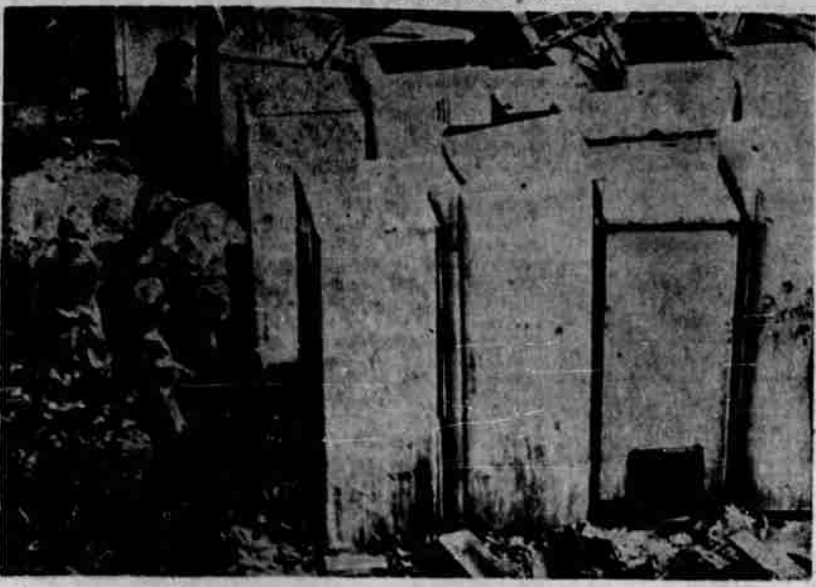


GET RID OF THOSE ICEBOXES

YCW to Hold Study Course

St. Angel—One World, One Christ, One Y. C. W. With this theme, a zealous corps of Young Christian Workers representing the west coast from Canada to San Diego will take part in a summer vacation study week here at Mount Angel Abbey and Seminary and the Mount Angel Women's College beginning next Sunday Aug. 23 until Friday, Aug. 28.

The group composed of ordinary working fellows and girls from various sections up and down the coast represents merely a part of the vast international organization called the Young Christian Worker movement. Begun in Belgium by a zealous priest, Canon Cardijn, the Y.C.W. has for its objective the restoring of Christ and his teachings back into the life of the worker.

The six-day meet affords an opportunity for all those attending to meet such Y.C.W. leaders as Msgr. Reynolds Hillenbrand of Hubbard Woods, Ill., Y.C.W. national chaplain; Red Sullivan, Chicago, national president; Miss Jean Pew, Los Angeles, Girls National president.

Young men and ladies in the area, whether or not they are presently connected with the movement, are invited to attend any or all of the sessions during the week.

Because of the specific aspects of the problems facing young men and girls differ, separate problems will be set up for each. All evening sessions, however, will be joint sessions and of general interest to all of the representatives to the Study Week.

On Monday evening, August 24, Red Sullivan, national president, will talk on how to have better meetings. Monsignor Reynolds Hillenbrand, national chaplain and pastor of Sacred Heart parish, Hubbard Woods, Ill., will speak on the encyclicals and the social teachings of the church. Other evening speakers will be the Very Reverend Bernard Sanders, O.S.B., rector of Mount Angel Seminary, and Miss Jean Pew, Los Angeles, vice president of the Young Christian Workers.

Prison Population of U. S. Higher This Year

Washington (AP)—U. S. prison population was higher at the beginning of this year than any year since 1940, the Bureau of Prisons reported today.

There were 167,374 prisoners in state and federal prisons at the end of 1952, an increase of 1.5 per cent from the previous year. Of the total, 6,239 or 3.7 per cent were women.

Facelifting for Crowfoot Bldg.

Lebanon — The Crowfoot grange hall, now being remodeled and modernized, was first a part of the old Mineral Springs college at Sodaville. For eight years it served as a dormitory for the college, standing on the level below and west of the college building. The location is now a part of the Sodaville school grounds.

This dormitory, built in 1896, was the home of the president of the college, J. R. Geddes, his wife and three children, as well as six teachers and a dozen boarding students. Mrs. Geddes was cook. The teachers assisted and most of the young women residents earned their board by helping with the house work.

It was the policy of this pioneer college to admit all students regardless of finances. Any kind of produce that could be used on the dormitory table was accepted in payment of tuition and board. It is said that the student who had spending money in his pocket was an exception.

When the college closed its doors the grange, first organized in Sodaville, bought the dormitory. In the summer of 1905, they put rollers under it and hauled it with horses across country by the most direct route to Crowfoot. It has been used there for grange purposes since that time.

320,000 Children to Get Polio Inoculation

New York (AP)—The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is turning over to the government enough gamma globulin to inoculate 320,000 more children against polio's crippling effects.

Beal O'Connor, foundation president, said 2,250,000 cubic centimeters of the serum is being given to the Office of Defense Mobilization for distribution to state health officers.

When the mother, Mrs. Gus Glaser, who had been waiting

hopefully, told the others, the house was filled with screams of joy. The younger children did somersaults and hand-springs.

He was reported missing in December, 1950, but the parents got word in March, 1951, that he was a prisoner.

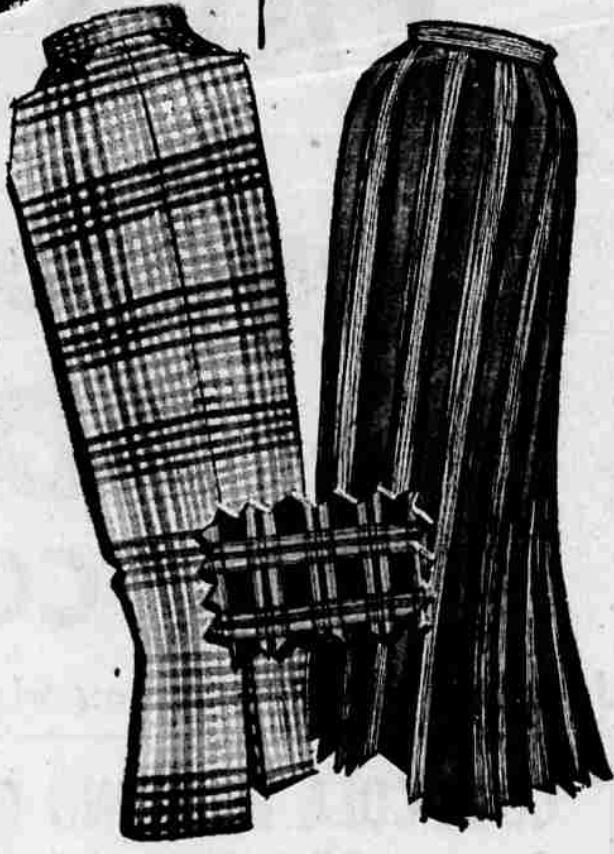
