Rev. Rice has previously been the choir director in churches in Gladstone and in West Portland, where he and his wife also taught in the Bible school. They have come to Salem from Sodaville where Rev. Rice was the pastor of the Evangelical United Brethren church.

Prof. Caliandro Speaks Wednesday

Rev. Anthony Caliandro, who was in the national headlines recently because of the protestant persecution in Italy, will be speaking in Salem Wednesday evening, August 26, at the First Evangelical United Brethren church, Marion and Summer.

Prof. Caliandro was born in Italy and began his education there but completed his college and graduate work in the U.S., receiving a B. Sc. and M. A. from New York university. After serving for many years in the United States as pastor, editor, teacher of Italian, civics and Americanization, and acting as director of Christ's Mission in New York City, Prof. Caliandro resigned all of his positions and returned to Italy to establish and open the Evangelical Biblical Institute, at Portici, Naples, Italy. This seminary is for the training of men for the gospel ministry in that country and operates several missions in nearby communities which are staffed by students of the institute. It was for his connection with this school that Prof. Caliandro was asked to leave Italy.
