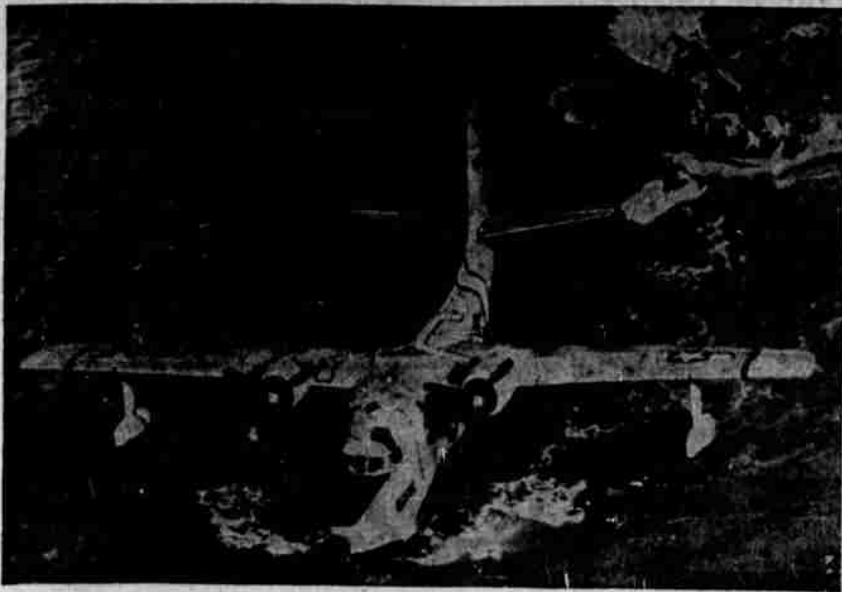


AIR FORCE PLANE RESCUES KOREAN SEAMAN

POW Tells of Seeing Dean

Freedman Village, Korea (AP)—A sergeant captured at Taejon early in the Korean war said today, "The last I saw of Gen. Dean he was in a jeep with a bazooka, chasing a tank." Sgt. Charles H. Panco, 34, was a machine gunner fighting from a position at a street corner in Taejon. There, on July 20, 1950, he last saw Maj. Gen. William Dean, then commander of the U.S. 24th Division. Panco was captured the next day. Dean also was captured in the Taejon battle. There has been no report when the communists intend to release him in the Korean war prisoner exchange.

Cook Held for Rape In Polk County Jail

Dallas—Held in the county jail at Dallas under \$2500 bond on a rape charge is Walter Stone, Jr., 32. Polk county officers took Stone into custody last Wednesday in a bean field. He gave his address as Independence and occupation as cook. He was born at Centralia, Ill.

424 Jets in Red Air Display

Moscow (AP)—The Soviet air force hurled 424 military jet planes, more than twice as many as last year, over Moscow's Tushino airport yesterday for the annual display of Russia's air might. Western observers said they noted no new types of aircraft. Accompanied by top Soviet leaders, Premier Georgi Malenkov watched the annual air show for 75 minutes from the airport balcony. Also on hand were western diplomats, including U.S. ambassador Charles E. Bohlen, foreign military, air and naval attaches, and 200,000 Russians.
