

Vandecoevering-Berg Wedding at Mt. Angel

Baskets of white, pink and yellow gladioluses and greenery were used in the church decorations, while arrangements of the same flowers and tall lighted tapers adorned the altars. The flowers were from the bride's parents' gladiolus farm in Grants Pass.

The Rev. Cyril Lebold, O.S.B. performed the double ring ceremony, and the Rev. Gregory Frank of New Orleans, La., officiated at the nuptial high mass.

For the music, St. Mary's church choir sang, with Miss Helen Keber at the organ. Mrs. Walter Smith sang before the ceremony and again preceding the recessional while the couple knelt at the Blessed Virgin Altar.

Peach Pineapple Preserves
Ingredients: 2 1/2 pounds (7 medium - size) ripe freestone peaches, one flat 9-ounce can crushed pineapple (drained), 5 cups of sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 tablespoons finely grated orange rind, 1/4 teaspoon almond extract.

Method: Wash, scald, peel and pit peaches, dice. Measure 5 1/2 cups into preserving kettle; add drained pineapple, sugar, lemon juice and orange rind. Stir to mix in sugar well. Place over heat and bring to a rolling boil. Cook over moderate heat about 20 minutes, stirring often so as not to scorch, until syrup runs off clean metal spoon 'n 2 lines of drops that sheet together. Remove from heat; skim. Stir in almond extract. Pour into hot, sterilized glasses; paraffin at once. Makes about seven 6-ounce glasses.

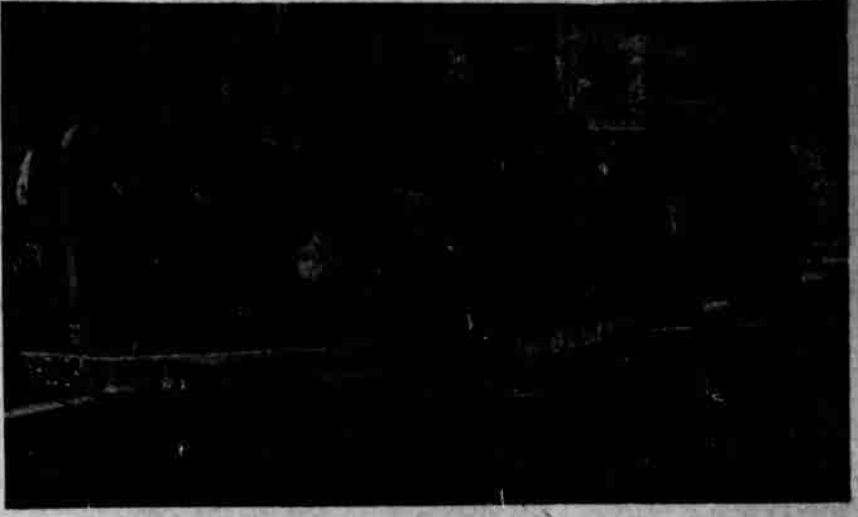
