## Safety Trophy Given Albany

Albany—For having no pedestrian deaths in 1951 due to traffic accidents, the city of Albany yesterday received the American Automobile association's award for "excellence of pedestrian record" from Ralph B. Cronise, a director of the Oregon State Motor association.

The AAA citation, citing the city in its report on the national pedestrian contest, was presented to Albany Mayor Charles McCormack and Police Chief Ray Maddy.

Judges of the AAA's pedestrian contest selected Albany for citation from 1,381 municipalities of all sizes competing. With Albany, nine other cities in Oregon received certificates of excellence for having no pedestrian deaths due to traffic accidents in 1952. They were: Corvallis, Astoria, Coos Bay, Lebanon, Hillsboro, Medford, Oregon City, Pendleton and Roseburg.

Albany—Two grand champions were acclaimed at the Linn County Fair 4-H Fair yesterday as the annual show got under way with a full barn of prize animals at the 4-H fairgrounds.

Swine events started with Lloyd Jochimsen, 14, of Oakville, the first champion crowned as he took the top ribbon in swine showmanship, barely edging out Don Bradshaw of Shedd, last year's champ. Lloyd also was junior champion, and Don won in the senior division.

The other blue ribbon winner was "Hambone," a 215-pound spotted Poland China hog who waltzed away with the swine grand championship. "Hambone" belongs to Darlene Wirth, 17, of Tangent, a member of the Greenback Swine club.

Reserve champions in swine showmanship are David Warren of Shedd, senior, and Charles McCloud of Lacombe, junior.

Taking the swine reserve championship for the second year in a row was Viola Ruby, RFD 3, Selco, who showed a Yorkshire hog. Swine events were judged by Edwin Ridder of Sherwood.

In the livestock judging contest last night, team honors went to the Riverside Livestock club, and the top individual score was recorded by Barbara Shelby, RFD 2, Albany, member of the Model Dairy club.

Sheep, rabbits, and poultry were in the spotlight this morning at the fair, with beef events scheduled for this afternoon. All market animals will be sold at the Fat Stock Auction tomorrow night with bidding to get under way at 8 p.m. Dan and Larry Roth will serve as auctioneers.
