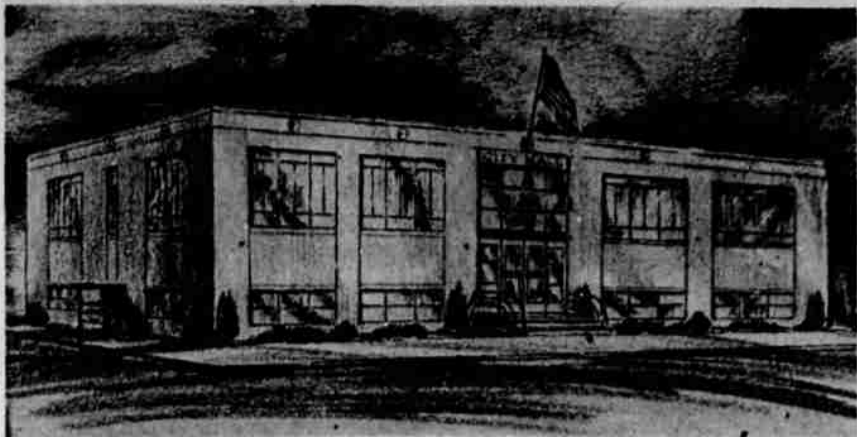


NEW CITY HALL FOR SWEET HOME

Sweet Home Sells Bonds For Building New City Hall

Sweet Home—Bids for the sale of the \$75,000 City Hall bonds were opened at the regular city council meeting.

One bid was submitted and that was by F. Lembke of First Sweet Home Bank. The bid was accompanied by a \$7,500 cashier's check as good faith deposit.

The council accepted the bid for 3 1/2 per cent interest and payment of \$98.07 for each \$100 par value of bonds.

Other business of the evening's meeting included:

1. Tiny Taylor was granted permission to move a structure without the necessity of constructing a continuous foundation after it was discussed by Building Inspector Bill Reed stating that the building needed to be set back farther and Mr. Taylor would move only as a favor to facilitate the traffic safety by removal of an obstruction which cut the view of both 14th Ave. and E St. motor traffic.

2 W. T. Stockett was given one week to make his foundation in compliance with the building ordinance after the case was presented by Building Inspector Bill Reed.

Mr. Stockett was given a building permit to place foundations under houses purchased from Willamette National Lumber Co., and after inspection were found not in compliance with the ordinance.

3. A letter from A. V. Gil-

bert was read requesting a curb cut to a proposed parking lot for the Central Super Market. The matter was referred to the street committee who met before the close of the session and granted Gilbert a building permit to construct a 15-foot driveway to the present parking lot west of 12th Ave., on L street.

4. The proposed petition which will be sent to Public Utilities Commission for authority to construct a crossing at grade with the Oregon Electric Railway at the 12th Ave. crossing was read and Mayor Ellis and City Manager Jess Parker were authorized by the council to sign the petition.

5. The motion was passed to write owners of property giving 10 days to either pay or bond. This referred to those street assessments and sewer assessments that had been made since passing the enabling ordinance No. 131 and upon which no action has been taken to pay or bond.

6. The Mayor read Ordinance bill 22 for 1953 which was an ordinance accepting the bid of the First Sweet Home Bank and it was passed for the second reading.

7. Mayor Ellis proclaimed the title of Ordinance Bill No. 19 for 1953 to become Ordinance Number 252. This dealt with making grass cutting mandatory on vacant lots

to eliminate a fire hazard in the summer months.

8. The Milburn assessment for street improvements had its third and final reading and Bill 20 for 1953 became Ordinance No. 253.

9. The council discussed the necessity for an ordinance regulating television installation and instructed that information be available for the next regular meeting.

10. The council also discussed the necessity for an ordinance to require reconstruction or removal of partially completed or partially destroyed buildings, but no action was taken at this meeting.
