Vancouver, Wash. (AP)—Two farms suffered damage when a twister struck near Ridgefield, 17 miles north of here, Wednesday afternoon.

The wildly swirling, funnel-shaped wind, first hit the farm of Don Wells, who said it picked up a prune tree and swept it 125 yards, knocked down a walnut tree and broke most of the windows in his barn.

A chicken house was moved 30 feet and its roof knocked off.

Wells said the wind then struck the farm of his cousin, Harvey Wells, a half mile away, and leveled a field of corn before dissipating.

## Boy Scout World Conference Ends

Vienna, Austria (AP)—The Boy Scout World Conference ended a meeting in Vaduz, Liechtenstein, Wednesday after picking Canada as host for the next conference and scout jamboree in 1955.

There was no indication of where in Canada the two simultaneous meetings will be held.

The conference announced that there are 5,562,000 Boy Scouts of all ranks in 55 countries, more than three million of them in the U. S.
