## Radio-Television

By managing to get a specially licensed portable broadcast station aboard the USNS General Walker an hour before the POW-carrying troopship tied up in San Francisco harbor yesterday, the CBS Television Network was able to broadcast exclusive interviews with some of the first group of repatriated U.S. prisoners of war to land on American soil since the Korean armistice.

On "They Come Home," a special live coast-to-coast broadcast from dockside in San Francisco harbor, CBS Television west coast newsmen William Winter, Lee Jerow and Robert Hansen interviewed dozens of returning prisoners of war from 15 states—many of them from atop a pile of life belts on the sun deck of the General Walker, and the rest as they came down the gangplank.

Typical of most of the interviews was the first, with Corp. Richard Grenier of 212 Ring street, Howland, Me. Corporal Grenier, who had been in a communist prison camp for 29 months, freely expressed his joy at being back in the States among friends and relatives. The 331 POWs aboard the General Walker had been interned from seven to 34 months and, in many cases, families had their first glimpses of the returnees on the CBS Television broadcast.

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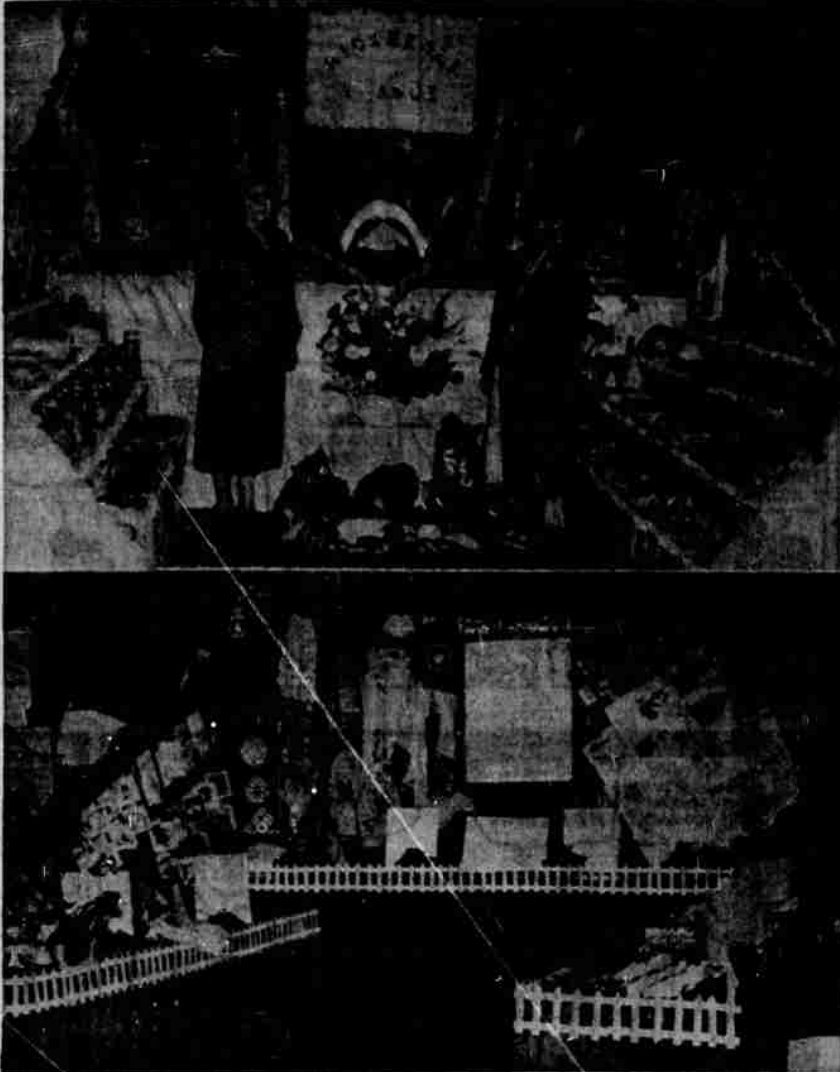

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## Seek Slash in Aid to Veterans

Washington (AP)—The Eisenhower administration has suggested that congress consider cutting down on the free medical aid given to veterans for ailments not connected with military service.

Otherwise, says Budget Director Joseph M. Dodge, the government will have to spend an additional hundreds of millions of dollars annually to handle a growing number of these cases.

Dodge and Lindsay G. Warren, comptroller general, asked a house veterans' subcommittee to reconsider "the extent of the federal government's responsibility toward veterans with non-service illnesses."

They made three specific recommendations in letters sent to the subcommittee in July and made public recently.

Dodge suggested that admission to veterans' administration hospitals for non-service illnesses be limited to veterans requiring treatment for more than 90 days. This, he said, would eliminate about 60 per cent of the cases now being treated.

## Ace Demers Aims to Prove His Bear Story

Ace Demers, who operates the Ace Flying service in Salem, plans to fly to British Columbia in search of a piece of bone left there in 1951 while Demers was on a hunting trip, according to an article he wrote in the forthcoming issue September of Outdoor Life.
