Ask Oregon to Join Oil Suit

Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton suggested Friday that Oregon join in a suit to test the constitutionality of the tidelands oil bill passed by the congress.

His suggestion was in a letter to the three members of the state board of control, Gov. Paul Patterson, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry and State Treasurer Sig Underander.

At stake are the offshore oil deposits along the coasts of California, Louisiana and Texas, variously estimated to be valued at between \$20 and \$50 billions, sulphur worth \$3 billions and possibly other mineral wealth, the attorney general pointed out.

He estimated Oregon's stake in these submerged oil lands to be "possibly half a billion dollars."

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Treasury Hikes Bond Interest

Washington (AP)—The Treasury announced Friday that holders of a 10-year, 2 per cent treasury bond maturing Sept. 15 may exchange them for a 1-year certificate of indebtedness paying 2 1/2 per cent or a 3 1/2 year treasury note paying 2 1/2 per cent.

About \$7,986,242,500 is outstanding in the maturing issue. This is the second time the new administration has offered holders of a maturing certificate the choice of exchanging for a short term or intermediate term obligation. The last occasion was in February when about 9 billion dollars in 1-year certificates of indebtedness came due.

The Treasury at that time offered a choice of exchanging the maturing 1 1/2 per cent certificate for a new 1-year certificate paying 2 1/2 per cent, or a 5 to 6 year bond paying 2 1/2 per cent.

The Treasury was hoping that the higher interest rates offered in the present exchange would bring about a better exchange into the longer-term security than was achieved in February. At that time only 620 million dollars of the maturing certificates were exchanged for bonds and over 8 billions was exchanged for the new 1-year certificate.
