

### Marine Corps Exhibit Due

Visiting Salem Thursday, September 3, will be a traveling Marine Corps exhibit, housed in a tractor-trailer that during the Salem stay will be located in front of the J. C. Penney company store.

The exhibit, which is open to the public without charge, is slated to be open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Master Sgt. William Davies, who is in charge of the local Marine recruiting station, is to be in charge of the display while it is here.

Four non-commissioned officers of the Marine Corps travel with the exhibit and are available to explain to the public.

Included in the exhibit are uniforms of both the men and women Marines; cold weather clothing and "thermos" boots; more than 50 pictures showing Marine Corps activities over the world; a 75 mm recoilless rifle; a 3.5 inch rocket launcher and rocket; and an over-size working model of the carbine and .30 caliber light machine gun.

The 45-foot tractor-trailer, which is on a three-month tour of eight western states, is arranged so visitors can walk through it to view the exhibits.

San Francisco (AP)—Editor John W. Powell, returning home after four years in communist China, denies he was a mouthpiece for Red propaganda.

"I called 'em as I saw 'em," he declared, and explained he had only information from the communists on which to base his writings.

"I never used the germ war charges in an editorial," he said, "nor did I accuse the United States of starting the Korean war—I just don't know."
