Food Seekers Face Jobs Loss

Berlin (AP)—Hungry East Germans who defy their communist zone bosses to seek free food in the west today faced loss of homes and jobs. The new Red threats of retaliation came as Mayor Ernst Reuter of West Berlin hailed the American relief program as a defeat for the communists as great as the June 17 workers revolt against the Red masters of the Soviet occupied zone. In a speech over the American radio station RIAS last night, Reuter said more than 3,000,000 East Germans defied communist blockades and terrorism to pick up the "Eisenhower food packages" distributed by West Germany. And, he said, more are "coming every day." Evidence of communist concern over the impact of the food distribution on East German residents was the order to discharge employes who go to the West for the free food as well as those campaigning for better working conditions in Soviet zone factories.

Innocent Plea By Rightnour

An innocent plea was entered before Judge George R. Duncan in Marion county circuit court Monday by Raymond John Rightnour to a charge of assault with intent to kill. The case will probably come up during the October term of court. Rightnour is said to have stabbed John Melton, Valsetz logger the night of July 18. Melton subsequently died but an autopsy indicated his death was due to pneumonia. Mrs. Ruth E. Glassburn, 37-year-old woman waived grand jury indictment and entered plea of guilty to two charges, one of cashing a not sufficient funds check at Anita Shop for \$35, and another of larceny by bailee in connection with the purchase of a range from Stiff Furniture company. Police believe Mrs. Glassburn has been involved in various operations that resulted in the loss to Salem merchants of some \$5000.

Policy Opposed By Wool Industry

Portland (AP)—Representatives of Oregon's wool industry Monday criticized the government's plan to sell its 100 million pound stockpile of wool. Sale of the stockpile at market value or near the appraised value will depress prices, James Coon, president of the Portland Wool Trade Association, said. An official for the Oregon Wool Growers Association said his group undoubtedly would protest the new selling policy. Coon said the sale would force the government to buy 1953 wools which other wise would have been sold in the private trade.

The pair enrolled in a work simplification course at Wayne University here yesterday. The course was especially designed for housewives suffering from heart ailments. However, university officials feel that the double amputees can benefit because the course is based on doing work while sitting. After enrolling, Mrs. Burgess confided: "I can't wait to get started. I want to do everything, all my housework by myself. Do you know I already scrubbed a floor last week. The Red Cross hired a girl for us for a year and she lifted me down on the floor so I could scrub it."

Cut in Taxes May Be Curbed

Washington (AP)—Rep. Richard M. Simpson (R., Pa.) said today congress may limit corporations to a 4 per cent income tax cut next April 1. Simpson, a ranking member of the tax writing house ways and means committee, said the proposal is a likely compromise in a new tax battle brewing between the Eisenhower administration and key republicans in congress. Under present law, corporations would get an automatic 10 per cent cut on April 1, the rates being reduced from 52 to 47 per cent of their taxable income. Simpson's "come promise" would fix the rate at 50 per cent, or an actual reduction of 4 per cent in the amount of tax paid.

Partially Paralyzed Mother Has Triplets

Bowling Green, O. (AP)—A 28-year-old mother, who has been "without the use of her legs" since she was 12, was resting comfortably here today in Wood County Hospital after
