- Ingredients: 1/2 cup quick or old-fashioned rolled oats (uncooked), 1 pound ground beef, 1 egg (lightly beaten), 2 tablespoons finely diced celery, 1 teaspoon prepared horseradish, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 teaspoon salt, dash of pepper, 4 tablespoons chili sauce.
- Method: Mix rolled oats, ground beef, egg, celery and seasonings except chili sauce. Grease 4 large custard cups. Spoon one tablespoon chili sauce into each cup. Pack meat mixture lightly over chili sauce. Bake in moderate (350 F.) oven 25 to 30 minutes. Turn out upside down and serve at once. Makes 4 large servings.
