

Beavers Win Two From Sacramento; Ponce Beats Stars

Portland (AP) — The Portland Beavers swept both ends of a doubleheader from Sacramento here last night, edging the Solons 3-2 in the opener and taking the nightcap 7-1. Beaver batters sided winner Lyman Linde, who gave up six hits, by bunching their 10 second-game hits for the seven runs. Marino Pieretti, who took the loss, was relieved in the sixth by Joe Yaylian. Portland scored its first tally in the opening frame on a double by Frankie Austin. Three runs in the third inning came off a single by Eddie Basinski and two errors. Herm Reich hit his 11th homer of the season in the eighth with Jim Russell on first to add a pair of insurance runs. In the opener Hank Arft and Basinski did all the Beaver scoring behind Glenn Elliott. Ken Gables' wild pitch in the second inning of the opener accounted for Portland's first score, allowing Arft to turn his triple into a run. Arft was in a scoring position again in the fourth after he hit a two-bagger and ran home ahead of Basinski, who clouted his sixth home run of the season. The Solons had the score even for a time when Bob Dillinger singled in the fourth and was driven by Neal Sheridan's double. In the sixth, Johnny Ritchie scored on Dillinger's double. LA Still Hopes To Get Major League Baseball

Los Angeles (AP) — Despite cold water tossed on the project a couple weeks ago, Los Angeles city fathers are going right ahead with the campaign to bring major league baseball here. Urged on by Mayor Norris Poulson, the Coliseum Commission Tuesday night passed a resolution asking authority from the city, county and state to study the feasibility of landing a big league team. The commission handles affairs of the 105,000 seat Memorial Coliseum, jointly owned by the three governmental units, where, all home football games of UCLA, Southern California and the professional Los Angeles Rams are played. The commission ordered to send a representative to major league owners to obtain suggestions; discuss with P. K. Wrigley the possibility of purchasing his Los Angeles Angels franchise in the Pacific Coast League and Wrigley Field here; and study further the feasibility of remodeling the vast coliseum for baseball.
