## Edmonton Win 8-7; Four Homers Swatted in Game

Edmonton, Alta. (AP)—Four home runs provided the fans with plenty of excitement last night as the Edmonton Eskimos sound out the Salem Senators 8-7 in their last WFL meeting of the season.

The loss put the Senators, now in third place, four games behind league-leading Spokane and three games behind second place Lewiston.

The Senators grabbed a 6-0 lead in the first three innings, with Jerry Ballard hitting a homer. In the bottom of the third Clint Weaver stepped to the plate with the bases loaded and hoisted the ball into right field for his 17th homer of the season.

With the score standing 6-4 the Eskimos added two tallies in the fourth to tie the count.

Whitney Thomson drove a line drive over the fence in the bottom of the eighth to send the Eskimos in front 8-6. The homer was hotly disputed by the Senators who claimed it was foul.

## Sandy, Durando Battle to Draw in Ten Rounds

St. Louis (AP)—Randy Sandy of New York and Ernie Durando of Bayonne, N.J., fought to a bruising draw in their middleweight 10-rounder last night.

Sandy, who was expected to be weak after training far below his usual fighting weight, came in at 149 pounds to Durando's 157½.

But the 21-year-old Negro would have won the close fight were it not for two low blows in the fourth round. Referee Dick Young gave that round to Durando on the fouls, 7-3, and that made the difference in a close, bloody encounter.

Young's sard had the match even at 50-50. Judge Fred Connell gave it to Durando 52-48, and Judge Jens Farrell had Sandy the winner 51-49.

There was action all the way as both men opened up in the first round. The pattern of the fight was established immediately as Sandy used his superior reach to keep Durando at a distance and off balance, scoring heavily with looping right and left hooks to the head and body. Durando moved in flat footed and punished Sandy whenever he could get in close.

The fight was televised nationally and locally.
