## Dahle Tosses Triumph; Ballard, Witherspoon HRs

Calgary, Alberta — Two home runs helped the Salem Senators to a 9-6 Western International League victory over Calgary here last night.

Jerry Ballard and Les Witherspoon clouted the home runs. Lefty Dave Dahle spaced 13 Calgary hits in chucking the victory for Salem.

The Spokane Indians held a two-game edge in the showdown with Lewiston for the Western International League second-half championship, but no one is conceding them the pennant.

Thursday night the Indians and Broncos struggled 12 innings before Spokane pulled out with a 9-6 decision. But the Broncos, who shot up from nowhere two weeks ago to become a pennant contender, have three more chances to stage another comeback.

The series will continue Friday night, Saturday and Sunday. The winner will meet Salem, the first half champion, in the post season playoff.

Stan Palys singled home Wilbur Johnson in the top of the 12th to win Thursday night's game. Then Will Hafey added a pair of insurance runs with his second homer of the evening.

Al Heist sent the game into overtime in the bottom of the ninth with the longest home run ever hit at Lewiston. The ball cleared the 405-foot sign opposite home plate.

## Sacramento, Portland Divide Doubleheader

Portland (AP) — The Sacramento Solons nudged a run across in the 11th inning to defeat Portland 6-5 in the second game of a PCL doubleheader last night after the Beavers had won the opener, 5-0, behind Fred Sanford.

The Solons' Bob Dillinger got his sixth straight hit of the game to bring in Lennie Attyd with the winning run in the nightcap. Dillinger accounted for half of the hits racked up by the Solons.

Dillinger also scored three runs. Former Beaver Joe Broyna hit his 17th homer of the season in the third with Dillinger on the paths.

Royce Lint tried for his 20th victory, but was taken out after being hit in the solar plexus with a line drive. Larry Ward wound up the loser and Milo Candini the winner.

Sanford was his most effective self in weeks in the seven inning first game. He kept six Sacramento hits well scattered for his seventh win against 11 losses. Dillinger got two of these hits.

Jim Russell hit his sixth homer of the season for Portland in the fourth.

The split kept Portland in fourth place and at an even .500 mark.

## LaStarza's Theory Says He'll Win Over Marciano

Greenwood Lake, N.Y. (AP) — Take it from a college man, according to the theory of relatively heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano will be dechampioned by challenger Roland LaStarza in their title fight at the Polo Grounds on Sept. 24.

The college man who figured this out is Roland LaStarza.

"Everybody knows that a squared plus B squared equals C squared," he quoth, which probably will come as ex-

clusive news to the entire fight mob. "The theory of relativity takes in these kinds of factors. There are also hidden factors." Confidence Plus

LaStarza's fractions, he explained, concerned the inability of some leather mitted gladiators ever to put the Indian sign on certain rivals.

"So you see," adds LaStarza, "everything is relative."

It may be so. Napoleon had his Waterloo, Sampson had his Delilah, and maybe Marciano has his LaStarza. One thing sure, though, come Sept. 24 his theory is going to get a relatively fine test by a muscular mathematician named Marciano.

It should be a right nice lesson in plain and fancy geometry.

## Good to Fair Fishing Reported Through Oregon

Portland (AP) — Oregon offers good to fair fishing prospects for the Labor Day week-end, the State Game Commission reported Thursday.

Angling has been only fair in the northwestern part of the state but some improvement is in prospect, the commission said. The Clackamas, McKenzie, Willamette and South Santiam rivers are reported fair. Cottage Grove and Fern Ridge Reservoirs are good for spiny ray fishing.

Trout fishing along the north coast and salmon angling in the Nahalem Bay and on the lower Columbia river are slow. Salmon fishing is improving in Tillamook and Neskowin bays and in tidewater, and fishing is fair in Lincoln county streams.

Southwest Oregon offers better prospects. Winchester Bay has been fair to good for silvers but very few Chinook are being taken. Fishing has been good in Siltcoos, Tahk-nitch and Tillamook lakes. Perch fishing is excellent. The Umpqua river and its tributaries are reported fair.

All waters of the Rogue river and its tributaries are dropping and clearing and trout fishing on the main river is improving. But salmon fishing is spotty.

In central Oregon Big Lava Lake has been producing many nice catches, and Crane Prairie Reservoir and East and Paulinda lakes are good. Limited catches have been taken from Thee Creeks lake, Davis, Odell and Gold lakes are only fair. Blue lake fishing is excellent, and fly fishing is good on both the upper and lower Deschutes river.

Prospects are even better in northeastern Oregon, where catches in the Wallowa high lakes have been excellent. Many limit catches of eastern brook trout have been reported from Minam, Blue, Mirror, Steamboat, Chaval, New Deal, Douglas and Aneroid lakes.
