# Oregon Prep Teams Open Grid Wars Next Week

Oregon high school football teams, with one week of practice complete, will start bearing down Monday for the first games of the long season starting next week-end.

Actually the opening prep event was a four-team Central Oregon jamboree at Prineville Friday night. But contestants played only partial games as will those in the Lane County Jamboree Saturday night and in the Lower Columbia League Jamboree at St. Helens Tuesday.

Games next Friday and Saturday should provide clues as to the strongest contenders for the end-of-season championship play-off berths.

Central Catholic of Portland, the 1952 Class A champion, is expected to get a good test from Albany Friday night.

The Rams, who edged Benson of Portland, 7-6, for the title, have a flock of veteran stars headed by Vince Altenhofen, deadly passing quarterback.

Benson, which has a big rebuilding job, travels to Kelso, Marshfield, a Class A semi-finalist rated No. 1 in the state through most of the Associated Press poll last year, will meet Crater of Central Point. The Pirates, with only two regulars back, also must find a lot of replacements.

Jefferson of Portland, the other semi-finalist and in a similar predicament, will get a rough workout from Vancouver, Wash., high.
