Hawaii and Other Far-off Places Part of Big Show

You've heard of the Hawaiian Luau, the feast for which
the Islands are famous.
There's a Hawaiian Luau of
another type in store for those
attending the night revue at the
Oregon State Fair—a feast of
Hawaiian music and dancing.
The revue has a strictly H-
awaiian background, but is not
entirely composed of Hawaiian
acts. Several other outstand-
ing numbers appear on the pro-
gram as guests to the "Islands."

Three of the top women performers are Princess Luans,
who came from the Islands
after she was chosen as Miss
Honolulu; Napus, known for
her work with Harry Owens
and his Royal Hawaiian United
Air Television show; and Elans,
talented singing and dancing
star, as well as an outstanding
musician, who is the narrator
for the Hawaiian presentation.
Princess Luana, whose par-
ents are Scotch-Hawaiian,
comes from Hilo, Hawaii, and
recently has been in Southern
California. She was a featured
dancer in Bing Crosby's pic-
ture, "Wakiki Wedding," ap-
peared in the Hawaiian Nights
musical film, toured with the
Hollywood Hit Parade and has
danced in several pictures and
on television shows. Last year
she went to Honolulu with the
KTTV television show "Open
Road."

A native of Hawaii, Napua
comes to Salem direct from the
Ambassador hotel in Los Ange-
les. As a child of four she start-
ed her dancing career and when
Harry Owens started the Royal
Hawaiian Orchestra she started
dancing with him. Later she
went to the Lexington Hotel in
New York and while in New
York played in "Hells a Pop-
pin'" with Olsen and Johnson.
Napua travelled the road and
has made recordings of her own
compositions. Motion pictures
have also claimed her. She is
a swimmer, as well as a dancer
and at 17 years of age became
a Hawaiian swimming cham-
pion.

These three women are only
a part of the talented group
that appears here. There is Mo-
nial, a dancer coming from the
Hotel Lexington, N. Y.; Paha-
na, a singer; Keokelolae, a
dancer featured on the Arthur
Godfrey show; Keokie, a male
Samoan knife dancer; The Is-
landers, a Hawaiian musical
group; three knife dancers, Ka-
lani, Lokiani and Lai Lie Luu;
and the girl dancers.

Other acts on the program
come from all parts of the
world.
One may be remembered for
a visit here a number of years
ago—the Arnauts. These two
brothers toured with Sr. Harry
Lauder when he made his last
appearance on the West coast
and visited Salem then. They
are a comedy team, outstand-
ing as pantomimists and re-
cently appeared on the Ed Sul-
livan "Toast of the Town" TV
show.

From London are the acro-
bats, Evie and Joe Slack, a
comedy and contortion team,
who came here directly from
Radio City Music Hall. As a
chef Joe Slack cooks up a
mighty fine dish when he pre-
sents Evie on a silver platter.

Ringling Bros. Barnum and
Bailey Circus for four years
featured Hubert Castle, light-
body artist who appears in the
revue. You'll see him perform
every type of tight rope trick
from ring jumping to bicycle
riding.

War Vet Killed When Car Strikes Bus at Canby

Canby (AP) — Frederick N.
Hoblitt, 36, recently discharg-
ed veteran from San Francis-
co, was killed early today
when his rented automobile
crashed into the rear of a
Greyhound bus on U.S. high-
way 99E.
Hoblitt apparently was Ore-
gon's first fatality as the La-
bor Day week-end got under-
way.

The mishap occurred at the
railroad crossing on the north
outskirts of Canby when the
bus, bound for Coos Bay,
made a stop.
State police said Hoblitt, a
brother of Mahlon Hoblitt,
owner of a Silverton news-
paper, was driving the car at
a high rate of speed when it
crashed into the halted bus.
The car, rented in Portland,
skidded nearly 60 feet before
hitting the bus which was
knocked ahead more than six
feet by the impact.
None of the bus passengers
appeared seriously hurt, al-
though several were checked
in Salem hospitals.

The bus, driven by William
S. Pedersen, Coos Bay, was
towed back to Portland while
passengers continued in an-
other bus.
Hoblitt's mother, Mrs. Flora
Hoblitt, also lives at Silver-
ton.

Jury Indicts Labor Bosses

Kansas City Mo. (AP) —
Oryville L. Ring, powerful
AFL Teamsters boss, and four
other labor leaders were un-
der indictment today on
charges ranging from robbery
to assault with intent to kill.
Ring, president of a Team-
sters local here, was named in
four of the 12 indictments re-
turned to Judge Ben Terte
yesterday.

Two of the indictments
charged Ring with robbery
and two with embezzlement.
Ring was a key figure in the
10-weeks old construction
strike here that cost an esti-
mated \$2,000,000 in payrolls.
He also was the target of a
five-day congressional in-
quiry into the extensive labor
tieup held here recently.
