Kraut Pork Chops With Apple Rings

Method: Melt butter and currant jelly in a skillet; add apple rings and brown. Remove apple rings and place pork chops in skillet; brown lightly on all sides. Mix sauerkraut and onions; place on top of browned pork chops. Cover and cook 30 minutes over low heat. Uncover and place apple rings on top of sauerkraut mixture; cover and continue cooking 30 minutes. Makes 4 servings.
