

San Diego Edges Beavers In 10-Inning Battle, 2-1

San Diego (AP)—Buddy Peterson's 16th-inning single broke up a tie and gave San Diego a 2 to 1 win over Portland in a PCL game last night.

The nip-and-tuck game had been tied at 1-1 from the fifth inning. Then, in the extra inning, Red Mathis got a fluke single when his bouncing grounder to third took a crazy hop and hit Don Eggert in the mouth.

Lloyd Dickey ran for Mathis and was sacrificed along by Bob Kerrigan. Then Peterson's single won the game before 1,398 fans.

Kerrigan (15-16) went the distance for the Padres. The Beavers starter was Lyman Linde, who was relieved by Red Adams in the eighth. Adams, losing pitcher, now has a 9-10 mark.

The Padres got their first run in the opening inning on singles by Peterson, Tom Alston and Dick Faber.

Portland tied up the game in the fifth when Frankie Austin doubled and scored on Jim Russell's single.

Durocher and Furillo Case To Be Studied

Cincinnati (AP)—President Warren Giles of the National League has changed his mind and now plans to investigate last Sunday's fight between Carl Furillo of the Brooklyn Dodgers and Leo Durocher, manager of the New York Giants.

Giles, who first dismissed the brawl as a "typical ball-players tussle," told a reporter he learned Furillo was quoted as saying, "I'll get him (Durocher) on the field, on the street, anywhere."

Neither Furillo nor Durocher landed a blow, but somebody stepped on Furillo's wrist during the melee and put him out of action until the World Series.

Johnson Upsets Ez Charles in 10-Rounder

Philadelphia (AP)—Harold Johnson will grant beaten Edward Charles a return bout at Milwaukee, Pittsburgh or Cincinnati before challenging for the heavyweight crown.

Tommy Loughrey, manager of Philadelphia Harold, explained today that a return bout agreement was made before Johnson won an upset, split 10-round decision over the ex-heavyweight champion at Connie Mack Stadium last night.

Charles angrily declared: "I beat him tonight in his home town, but I didn't get the decision. It'll be different next time when I get him out of his own backyard."

The 32-year-old ex-champ from Cincinnati and Johnson staged an excellent, close fight before 8,462 in the Philadelphia Athletics' ball park. The gate of \$36,680 was somewhat disappointing for promoter Herman Taylor.

Johnson, scaling only 177 pounds to Charles' 185 1/2, went into the ring an 11-5 underdog, but he wound up tagging Charles with his second consecutive defeat and further shattering his dream of becoming the first man to recapture the heavyweight crown.

Cincinnati Ezzard had been top contender until upset by Cuba's Nino Valdez at Miami Beach, Fla., on Aug. 11.

Referee Buck McTierman favored Johnson on rounds, 8-3-1; Judge Lou Tress had him ahead, 7-3; but Judge Joe Capristo voted for Charles, 5-4-1.

Lettermen returning are guard Orval Hadley and center Cecil Todd.

Coach Anderson and assistants Charles McNatt and Milt Baum will round out the Silverton team chiefly with players who were on the Silverton junior varsity team last year, or who played as reserves on the varsity.

They include backfield men Bryan Shaw, Duane Mattox, Dick Glassner, Rodney Kjos, Keith Cooley and Norm McCullough; ends Roy Anderson and Bob Robbins; tackles Earl Bleakney, Don Gilham and Ron Jorgensen; and center David Gentry.

All in all, the Silverton team will be short on weight as well as on experience for the 1953 season. Last year Silverton finished second in the Willamette Valley league with a record of six wins and one loss, losing only to Mt. Angel.

Of the 1953 WVL prospects, coach Anderson says, "We believe that the WVL will be stronger this year than last. To win a WVL championship it seems that a team must win all of its games. We feel that we have a greater possibility of losing them all than of winning them all."

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Pro-Am Golf Tourney Slated For Walla Walla

Walla Walla (AP)—The lush greens and tree-lined fairways of the Walla Walla Country Club will be the scene next week of the annual two-day Northwest Pro-Amateur Golf Tournament.

Set for Sept. 17-18, the 36-hole tourney will offer cash prizes of \$1,500 for professionals and \$600 in merchandise for the amateur entrants. Each year the event attracts pro-amateur pairs from all sections of the Northwest.

The Country Club course has a par of 36-36-72 and has been the scene of several outstanding northwest and state tournaments.

Other participants in the battle royal portion of the wrestling party were Paul DeGalls, Greg Jarqu, Johnny Henning and Jack O'Reilly.

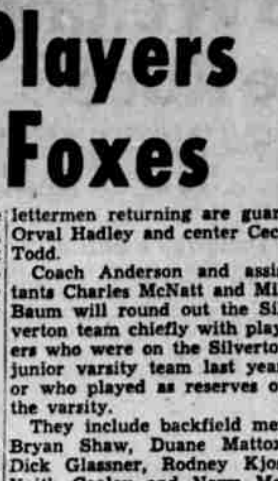
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Wins Again
