Girl From Rickreall Wins Trip to Chicago

Tilted haired Mary Jane Wait of Rickreall won a trip to Chicago in November because she was the Oregon 4-H Health club member making the best achievement in health improvement during the past year.

Mary Jane, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Wait of Rickreall, was chosen as the winner at the Oregon State Fair Wednesday afternoon. Her alternate is Harold Berger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Berger, Route 4, Hillsboro, who may also get to make the trip to Chicago.

The winner of the trip is 15 years old and has been a member of the Health club for two years. She has been in 4-H club work for five years, belonging also to a sewing and cooking club. This year Mary Jane enters Salem high school as a sophomore.

Young Berger is a junior in the Hillsboro high school this year and has been in club work for seven years. He has belonged to the health club for five years. In addition he has been a member of a dairy club and a garden club and for a

year a member of the poultry club.

To be eligible for the trip to Chicago a 4-H club member must have been 14 years old by the first of January, 1953. The awards are under the national health improvement program sponsored by the Kellogg company. Going east with the health winner will be Esther Taskerud, state extension agent for 4-H clubs, and Burton Hut-ton, state 4-H club leader and from 15 to 18 other 4-H club members representing various types of 4-H club projects. The latter will be selected in October and the entire group will leave for the east on Thanksgiving day.

In addition to the top winner and the alternate two other winners were selected. These young persons who were Linda Welp of Olex in Gilliam county, and David Carlson of Rickreall. Linda and David will receive 4-H club summer school scholarships from the State Farm Insurance company.

Linda, who is 13, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Welp. It is her sixth year in 4-H club work. Other clubs to which she has belonged are canning, cooking, homemaking and sewing. Linda is a freshman at the Arlington high school this year.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. R. V. Carlson, Rickreall, David is in the eighth grade at Rickreall and is 12 years old. He has been a Health club member for two years and in club work for five years. The clubs included bachelor sewing and wood-working.

Used in rating the club members for their health improvement are health habits, food habits, participation in other individual health activities, participation in group health activities.

Also announced Wednesday afternoon were the 10 top 4-H health clubs in the state, with the selection made after considering the number of 4-H members enrolled in 4-H project or activity, the individual health activities of club members, the health improvement program of the club, methods, procedures and techniques used in individual and club health projects or activities.

In this top 10 were four clubs from Polk county. These included the Salt Creek Health club, Salt Creek; Bridgeport Health club, Dallas; the Oak Point 4-H Health Helpers, Oak Point, and the Health Vitamins, Rickreall.

Other clubs in the top group were the Busy Bee Health club, Lacombe, Linn county; Seth Fun-O-Pep club, Gaston, and Steps to Health club, Hillsboro; both Washington county; Ironside 4-H Health club, Ironside, Malheur county; Cheerful Health club, Baker, Baker county, and Toolers for Good Health, Portland Beach school, Multnomah county.

Texas Sends Hereford Bulls

Thirty-two Hereford herd bull prospects and 32 select Hereford females from seven western states have been consigned to the Pacific International sale to be held in Portland October 23.

The sale of these top quality Herefords will be a featured event at this year's P-I to be held October 20 to 24.

Traveling the greatest distance to this year's P-I sale are seven head of good Herefords from the state of Texas, consigned by W. J. Largent, Merkel, Texas; W. J. Fullwiler, Abilene, Texas; and McBride Bros., Blanket, Tex.

From the state of Utah, three head are consigned to the sale by Peterson Brothers, Ogden.

From Nevada, George Schuman and Sons, owners of Clover Valley Ranch at Wells, have consigned six head.

Five head of Herefords will be in the sale from California from the ranches of Sacramento to Hereford Ranch, Sacramento and Keith Daulton of Madera.

Idaho breeders have consigned two head from Beau Meek and Ted Reins, both of Payette.

Twenty-one Herefords will be in the sale from the following Washington ranches: Aldarra Farms, Seattle; Jack Benscoter, Pullman; Columbia Hereford Ranch, Hunters; Dic Matson, Naches; James C. Hay and Sons, Ellensburg; L. C. Staley, Pullman; A. V. Harrel and Son, Ellensburg; John Clerf and Son, Ellensburg; Ed Rea, Riffe; Gordon McGough, Prescott; and Francis Callahan, Ellensburg.

Twenty head of sale cattle are from the following Oregon ranches: Joe Fisher, Warren; Fred Cox and Son, Grass Valley; Harry Harbert, Eugene; J. L. Jacobs and Sons, Prineville; Walter P. Hubbard and Son, Junction City; Sam Holmes, Bend; Double M Ranch, Adams; and Herbert Chandler and Son, Baker.

Last year's top priced sale bull was consigned by Chandler Ranch and sold for \$6100 to Coffey Hereford Ranch, Chehalis, Wash., while the top female was consigned by Double M and sold for \$5000 to Lucky Hereford Ranch, Gilroy, Calif.

Operating for the first time as a Register of Merit Show the 1953 P-I is expected to draw many of the top Hereford show cattle from all over the western states. This year's Hereford show will be held on Thursday, October 22. Harry Parker, prominent Hereford breeder from San Luis Obispo, Calif., will judge the breeding classes.

Cascade High Opens Sept. 21

Cascade Union high school will open the 1953-54 school year September 21 at 9 a.m. All students are urged to pay fees and check registration September 16, 17 and 18. The school will be open for registration all three days and from 7 to 9 p.m. the evenings of September 16 and 17 for students who are working.

On the evening of September 18 the Cascade Cougars will oppose Silverton in the Cascade opening football game of 1953 at Silverton.

Cascade will have three new members on the faculty for the new school year. They are Miss Monte Middlebush, graduate of Oregon State college, who will teach girls physical education and one freshman class in English; Lyle King who coached all sports at Harrisburg high school last year will be head coach of basketball and will teach social economics and boys physical education; David Evans of Portland will teach junior and senior English and one class in journalism.

Those remaining from last year's faculty are Louis J. Uhrhammer, principal; Milton E. Gralop who will teach science; Roy E. Hough who will teach freshman math, algebra and geometry; Harold Dutton, teacher of agriculture; Robert Stewart, head of the guidance department, football and baseball coach, will teach freshman subjects; John Seim will teach freshmen and sophomore English classes and be head of dramatics; Martha Angus will be head of the commercial department and will teach typing and office practice; Ruth Riches will be librarian and teach a class in bookkeeping; Lora E. Bates will teach American history and world history; Eleanor DeCamp will teach home economics and art; Richard Bassien will teach driver training and general wood shop; William Bissell will teach all music classes including band; Garth Rouse will handle all veteran agriculture classes; Margaret Riches will be clerk and secretary to the principal.

E. F. Ruby will again be head custodian and Melvin Nichol will be his assistant; Mrs. Irene Hough will be head cook for the cafeteria and will be assisted by Mrs. Mary Benner and Mrs. Jane Nicholson.

The remaining members of the school board are Louis Scofield, chairman, Delmer Barber and Howard Gilbert from last year and the new members are Dixon Vose from Marion and Jack Speer from

Aumsville. The new members replace Fred Comstock who moved to Albany and Karl Wipper who moved into the Turner district from the Cloward district.
