## World Bank Retains China

Washington (AP)—The world bank and industrial monetary fund refused Wednesday to expel Nationalist China and admit Red China in its place. A proposal to bring Communist China into the 55-nation economic organization was made by Czechoslovakia at the opening session of the eighth annual meeting here of governors of the bank and fund. It lost on a show of hands. India and Yugoslavia voted for the resolution. There were many abstentions. In a message of welcome, president Eisenhower pledged full support for international effort aimed at "the quickening of trace," the development of resources and the stabilization of currencies. He called the bank and fund "outstanding example of achievement. Tornadoes helped raise the number of people killed in accidents which took five or more lives in the United States during the first half of 1953 to 1,000.
