

Curriculum Report Made On New So. Salem High

Plans for the operation of the new South Salem high school are proceeding apace with the construction of that multi-million dollar project, according to a curriculum report made to the directors Tuesday night by Supt. Walter E. Snyder.

The contractors are making satisfactory progress on the huge structure and barring unforeseen developments, it will be ready for use in September, 1954.

Superintendent Snyder outlined the differences in the courses of study between the North and South schools. Graphic arts will be maintained at the South senior high and the agricultural course will be continued at the North unit. Tenth grade students will not be faced with the necessity of taking biology as a required subject.

To take up the lag between the receipt of new tax monies and the payment of bills owed by the district, Clerk C. C. Ward was authorized to secure short time loans from the U. S. National and First National banks up to a maximum of \$500,000. The rate will be 3 per cent. There is an immediate need for \$100,000, reported Ward.

Ward gave a brief report of his participation in the annual convention of National Association of School Business Officials, held at Cleveland in Oc-

tober.

Robert DeArmond, attorney for the board, briefed the recent supreme court opinion dealing with teacher tenure. As the courts interpret the tenure act, a teacher is either working on the three-year probationary period, is on tentative or is a bonafide substitute. This means a board could place an instructor on tenure immediately after entering the system. This situation is not to the liking of those teachers who have worked their way through the probationary period. However, it is not anticipated that the ruling will have any effect upon the Salem system other than to make sure that new teachers are placed on probation.

If present population trends continue there will be need for an additional 14 classroom instructors by next year, reported Assistant Superintendent Harry Johnson.

The board authorized the hiring of a full time secretary for Carl Aschenbrenner, South Salem high principal. Miss Joanna Clemenson of Canby was elected sixth grade teacher at McKinley.

Slight changes in the athletic field between Leslie junior high and the South Salem senior high buildings were authorized. The changes will give additional playing space without hindering other operations. It will be necessary to move two light poles, move the fence on the south side and blacktop the south, west and north areas bordering the field. Additional tiling will also be needed.

Building Use Policy Made

A policy concerning the use of school buildings by outside groups was outlined and adopted by the school board Tuesday night.

When the facilities are to be used by such youth groups as Boy Scouts, YMCA, Gra-Ys and other organizations sponsored by Community Chest supported agencies, a charge of \$1 will be made. However, there is the provision that the district will not be put to additional expense in the matter of janitorial service, light or heat and that there is responsible leadership.

Use of the building must be cleared with the school principal who will determine whether such use will conflict with the school program.

Use of buildings by adult groups such as the PTA will be without charge when such meetings are primarily for the benefit of the school or community.

Britain Setting up Atomic Corporation

London (AP) — Britain is setting up an atomic energy corporation to speed the development of atomic weapons and nuclear power for industry.

Plans for the new government-controlled body—similar to the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission—were disclosed last night in a government white paper. It said a preliminary transfer of authority from the Ministry of Supply, which has run Britain's atomic program thus far, would take place Jan. 1.
