**Mexican Style Supper**  
Meat Sauce with Corn Chips  
Shredded Lettuce and Avocado

**Meat Sauce with Corn Chips**  
Ingredients: 1 tablespoon fat, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 3/4 pound ground chuck beef, 3 tablespoons chili sauce, 1 tablespoon water, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon chili powder, 1/2 teaspoon dried crushed oregano, 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt, packaged corn chips, grated sharp cheddar cheese.

Method: Heat fat in skillet; add onions and lightly brown; add meat and stir until crumbled and browned. Add chili sauce, water, salt, pepper, chili powder, oregano and garlic salt. Simmer, stirring often, until flavors combine. Serve over corn chips; sprinkle with cheese. Makes 3 servings.
