Paul Gets Key Of San Francisco

San Francisco (AP)—After bringing a reminder of ancient Greece to one of America's big centers of learning, King Paul of Greece participated in a typical U.S. ritual Thursday—accepting the key to the city. King Paul and Queen Frederika were to be formally received at city hall and attend a civic luncheon before entraining for Los Angeles. Wednesday, some 11,000 persons ignored a threat of rain to see the royal couple at the massive, columned Greek theater at the University of California in Berkeley, at one time the scene of classical drama performances in the original Greek. "Democracy as you know it today is based upon the thinking, planning and dreaming of men who lived more than 2,000 years ago," Paul told the overflow audience. "Now, this proud heritage of the Greek mind has come to bloom in the heart and soul of the American people. Freedom is the message that came from Greece. Unity is the message that comes from you."

Oregon Nut Crop About Harvested

Corvallis (AP)—Oregon's nut crop is just about all harvested, with quality and size good. The yield, though, especially on filberts, was under last year. Fred H. Dahl, agricultural economist for the extension service, said some of the Willamette Valley walnuts lost in quality because of shrivel but that the quality generally was satisfactory to good. Filbert quality was listed as good. Prices have been steady to strong. Half of American women who reach age 65 will live 15 years longer and a third of them will live for 20 years.

Study of Origin of Fish in Pacific Sought

Washington (AP)—Delegate Bartlett (D., Alaska) said Thursday it is "imperative" that the United States begin investigations to determine the origin of fish in North Pacific waters. Bartlett told Secretary of the Interior McKay in a letter that he was gratified to learn the department is requesting funds to finance such a study by the Fish and Wildlife Service. Under the North Pacific fishery agreement reached by this country, Canada and Japan, fishermen of the latter nation agreed not to fish in North American waters. Japanese fishermen, under the convention, must fish west of a line running through the Aleutian islands. The Japanese also agreed to move further west if biological investigations proved that some of the fish found within their fishing area originated in North American waters.

Wants Russians To See H-Bomb

Washington (AP)—An atomic energy commissioner suggests that foreigners, presumably including Russians, should see a U.S. hydrogen bomb exploded as a sample of the destructive alternate to world peace. The idea, expressed by Thomas E. Murray last night, came as America was readying another and probably more fierce hydrogen test blast. Murray, the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) member who recently announced the launching of the first program for harnessing nuclear power as industrial power, made his H-bomb suggestion in a speech at Pittsburgh. He said first-hand observation of an H-bomb's thunder "is an essential qualification for future negotiators of the great survival issues in the years ahead." Such an American showing, he added, might persuade the Russians to match it with a demonstration of their own.

Election of Magsaysay Conceded by Quirino

Manila (AP)—Tired, ailing President Elpidio Quirino today conceded victory in the Philippines presidential election to youthful, vigorous Ramon Magsaysay, who won in a landslide. The 46-year-old winner, a staunch friend of the United States, becomes the third president of this seven-year-old republic. He is to take office January 1 for a four-year term. Quirino steps out after six years in office. With about 60 per cent of Tuesday's vote tabulated, the unofficial count was Magsaysay, 2,269,131 votes to 1,002,566 for Quirino. The concession statement by the 62-year-old Quirino, still recovering from two major stomach operations in the United States, was read to newsmen by his press secretary. "In this year's election," it said, "evidently the people expected much in a change of administration. My most fervent prayer at this hour is that the change is for the better. The people's verdict should be accepted for the sake of national unity. I have nothing but good wishes for the country and my successor." Magsaysay was cruising in Manila Bay on the palatial yacht of Adm. Richard H. Cruzen, commander of U.S. naval forces in the Philippines, when word reached him that Quirino had conceded.

Justice of Peace to Be Tried for Game Violation

Grand Ronde—A legal test of the interpretation of Oregon hunting laws is scheduled to be made in district court at Albany Monday when Justice of the Peace Alvin Hulett of Grand Ronde and Ralph McKern appear for trial. The two men are charged with violating the hunting laws by hunting game birds from an automobile. They are to appear before District Judge Wendell Tompkins in Albany at 9:30 a.m., Nov. 16. The complaint, signed by Curtis Reuker of the State Police, charges that the defendants hunted pheasants from a car near Brownsville on or about Oct. 25.

Judge Hulett, however, takes exception to the charge. What happened, he asserts, was that he and McKern were driving to the home of McKern's brother near Brownsville to hunt pheasant, when they stopped their automobile and McKern walked into a field, fired one shot at a pheasant rooster and missed. No arrest was made at the time and no one but the two hunters was present. Judge Hulett said, but after nearly three weeks a charge was filed and a warrant served. "If I could see that either my hunting partner or I was guilty of any offense whatever, I would plead guilty and pay whatever penalty might be imposed," Judge Hulett said, "but I am completely innocent as is Mr. McKern. We intend to demand a jury trial and find out what motivates such an action by the questioning of witnesses in the case." Judge Hulett is handicapped and confined to a wheel chair.
