Rifle Fire Kills Hunter

Astoria (AP)—An elk hunter's bullet killed Richard C. Roadman, 29, Portland, in the Coast Range southeast of here Wednesday, the seventh hunter to be killed by rifle fire in Oregon this autumn.

State Police Sgt. H. K. Heales said Roadman had been hunting with another Portlander, Bobby Dean Johnson, 28, in the Saddle Mountain area.

He said Johnson made his way out of the woods to Necanicum Junction to report that Roadman had been hit accidentally by a bullet. The sergeant said he had no other details to disclose yet.

Johnson was shaken by the death, and could not lead searchers directly to the scene. They wandered three hours through heavy undergrowth before finding the body.
