

### Thieves' Loot Totals \$2350

A pickup truck stolen from Newberg Tuesday night and believed used in the burglary of two St. Paul businesses the same night has been recovered where it was abandoned north of Vancouver, Oregon state police officers were notified by Washington authorities Thursday. In the pickup were some loose cigarettes and cigars of the same brand taken in the burglary.

Liquor and other merchandise taken in the burglary of the St. Paul Market and the Copeland Lumber company in St. Paul Tuesday night has been evaluated at about \$2,350 following an inventory of stock, state police reported late Wednesday.

C. L. Vandewiele, owner of the market, said 41 cases of liquor were taken from the state liquor agency in the market, and about 20 to 30 cartons of cigarettes, a large box of assorted candies and some change from the cash register were taken from the store.

About \$300 worth of tools and nails were taken from the lumber company, Manager W. C. Fenton said. The loot included six power tools, a large number of hand tools and six kegs of nails.

### Woman Shuns Walk Killed in Collision

Grants Pass (AP)—A 78 year old woman who decided to take her car instead of walking across the highway in front of her house was killed in a collision Wednesday.

Mrs. Dora Brown drove from her home, intending to cross the Redwood Highway to visit a friend in a mortor court across the way.

Sgt. C. R. Borgman of the state police said a car driven by Lloyd Silvius, Eureka, Calif. crashed into it in fog and rain. Neither Silvius nor his wife was injured. They were en route to Roseburg to visit a son, ill in a hospital.

### 2 KILLED IN BUS-CAR COLLISION, NINE HURT

Cucamonga, Calif. (AP)—Two persons were killed and nine injured in the collision of a west bound Greyhound bus and an auto Thursday, the State Highway Patrol reported.

Attendants at San Antonio hospital, upland said apparently none of the injured was in critical condition.

### Indian Case Ruling Reversed

Portland (AP)—Henry B. Taylor, The Dalles, who financed a fraudulent Indian land transaction, cannot expect the government to help him get his money back, a federal court decision said Wednesday.

Henry Hess, federal district attorney, said this decision from the Circuit Court of Appeals at San Francisco reversed District Judge Gus Solomon's ruling that the Indian land should be resold and the \$135,000 purchase price restored to Taylor.

The government has no interest in what happened to the money Taylor used to finance the deal, the appeals court decision said.

Taylor used an intermediary in the deal to acquire valuable timber lands near Gold Beach for a portion of their actual worth. Taylor and his associates were convicted of fraud.

### Three Men Suspected Of Bank Burglary

Portland (AP)—Portland police arrested three men Wednesday and said they were suspected in the \$27,300 burglary of a Cottonwood, Idaho, bank last month.

The men, who denied any part in the burglary, were booked as Theodore J. Audett, 50, a convicted bank robber; Walter Clyde McClure, 33, and Donald D. Hall, 20, all of Portland.

### LOGGER KILLED

Coos Bay (AP)—Russell A. Taylor, 40, Delwood, Ore., was killed Tuesday at the Mink Creek camp of the Irwin Lumber Co. A logging truck rolled onto him as he was removing blocks from the wheels. The widow and five children survive.

### Old Clock Gives Out Nasal Grunt

When the big clock in City Hall tower struck one Thursday afternoon it didn't give out with a loud and prolonged bong-n-n-n-n.

Instead it was a soft and short "ponk."

The face of the old clock was lifted and cleaned when it was moved from the old Courthouse to City Hall. But tears almost ran down its nice new face today when the hammer and gong that for 70 years have been striking lustily made only a kind of nasal grunt.

It was the same at 2 o'clock, and it's going to be the same from now on—anyway for awhile.

Today workmen put a leather boot on the hammer to muffle the sound when the clock strikes the hours. For guests of the Senator Hotel nearby complained that it woke them up at night.

At first it was thought the striking mechanism could be cut off completely at night, but it was found this couldn't be done.

"Maybe the muffler will work and maybe it won't," said City Engineer J. H. Davis. "We'll just have to find out. If it doesn't we'll have to try again. Of course, we could take out the striking mechanism completely, but we don't like to do that."

Some objections from the public reached City Hall when a news story said the striker was to be cut off at night.

### No Divorce for Dorothy McGuire

"Everything is now clarified," Brown said. "I have withdrawn my request for leave. There will be no divorce."

Miss McGuire is a featured singer on the Arthur Godfrey show.

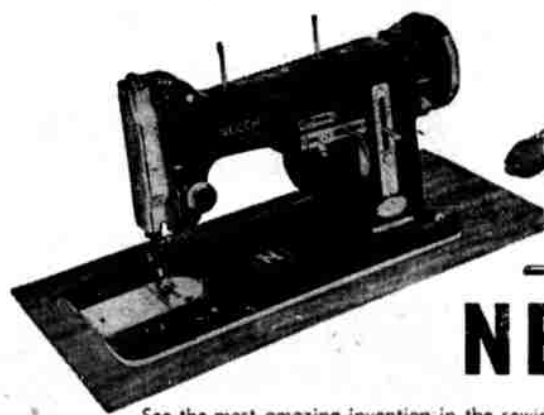
