Hadassah also maintains seven major hospitals in Israel, including two devoted exclusively to the treatment of tuberculosis, a new medical center consisting of a 430 bed teaching hospital, an out-patient department, new buildings for the Hadassah medical school and new quarters for the Hadassah sponsored nurses training school. These hospitals provide medical care for more than 150,000 children in 360 schools, and kindergarten and give pre-natal and post-natal care to expecting mothers and infants.
