

AAUW Fetes New Group In Branch

New members were honored at the luncheon meeting of Salem branch, American Association of University Women, Saturday at the Marion. There are more than 40 new members in the branch this year and a large group of them was introduced at the Saturday luncheon and presented corsages.

Mrs. Robert Y. Thornton, state AAUW president, was speaker. She reviewed the national convention in Minneapolis in the summer and also gave a review of the history of AAUW.

Mrs. Thornton gave a brief outline of the development of AAUW since it was founded in 1881 by a group of 17 graduates representing 8 colleges, to its present membership of 122,000 women representing 339 colleges. The first Oregon branch was established in Portland in 1905, followed by Eugene in 1912, Corvallis in 1921 and Salem in 1922. The state board of AAUW was organized at a meeting in Salem in October, 1924 and now supervises 27 branches in Oregon. In many small towns, Mrs. Thornton pointed out, AAUW is the only group that has brought cultural programs to the community.
