All were written for different instrumental combinations. The 5th calls for solo clavier, solo flute, solo violin, and the string orchestra. The three movements follow the fast-and-slow tempo pat-tern. The second movement is written for solo instruments only, while the other move-cents proceed in alternation between the solo and orchestral tween the solo and orchestral groups. Soloists for the per-formance of this work are: Lis-beth Shields, plano; Marie De-Harpport, flue; Sally Bolliger, Glolin.
