

Later Grid Practices Proposed

E. A. Carleton, principal of Salem Senior High School, will attend an all-day meeting of the legislative assembly of the Oregon Activities Association Friday morning and a meeting of the board of control of the same organization Saturday morning in Portland.

Acting fifth vice president of the organization that handles details of tournaments, play-offs, awards, eligibility, and regulations governing all activities in Oregon high school, Carleton, if elected permanently in the Friday session, will complete a five year term vacated by Mr. John Cox after his move from Hillsboro to Albany.

In the Friday session, 22 representatives from 11 districts will meet in annual session to make and review regulations governing high school. Saturday's meeting will be that of the executive body which carries out the rules and regulations.

Later Practices Possible

One amendment to be decided by the legislative body will be the possible readjustment of the opening of the high school football season from late in August to September.

Woodburn to See 'Trout Story' Film

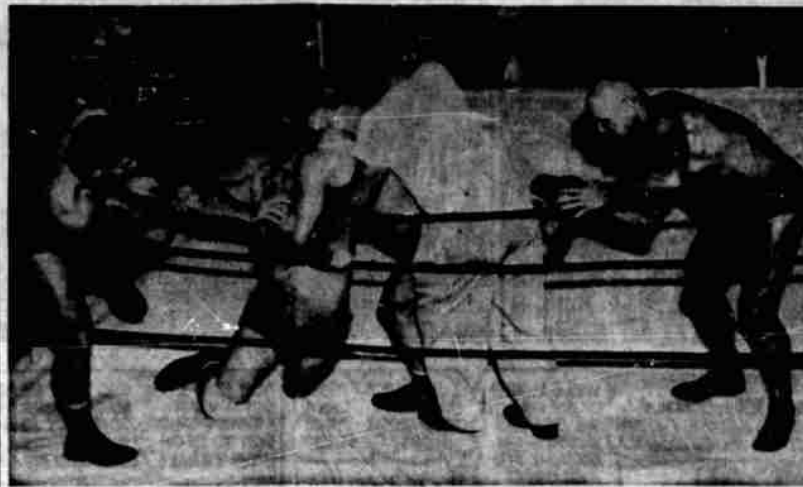

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Linfield to Open 25 Game Slate Dec. 2; Tourney Set

McMinnville—A fat 25 game schedule awaits Coach Roy Helder's Linfield Wildcats right after Thanksgiving vacation.

Helder, starting his second year as head man of the Catcasaba outfit, plans to work the Cats through most of the vacation, giving the players just Thanksgiving day.

First game for this year's club will be December 2, against Clark Junior college at Vancouver. Nine other non-conference games are on tap, with the Northwest conference slated to start January 8.

Plan Grads Tourney

The Linfield College athletic department is now deep in the planning stage for the second annual Old Grads tournament. A total of 16 teams, eight more than last year, will tangle in the tourney open to teams coached by former Linfield athletes. It is divided into two brackets, and set for four days. It will start December 9.

Seven of the eight teams that competed last year will be back, with only defending champion Oakridge not returning. Tourney will be conducted in two eight team brackets, chosen by draw. It will be a single elimination tourney for the championship, but every team will still go for a final position, playing three games.

Bracket divisions have been labeled "Cardinal" and "Purple," and winners of both will be given trophies. Play will start Wednesday night, December 9. Dayton will tangle with Stayton and Willamina will take on Shedd in the first night game. Both games are in the "Cardinal" division.

Six games are scheduled for Thursday, with eight on both Friday and Saturday. Championship games in both divisions will be Saturday night.

Chart Shows Sooners Gain 130 Miles in 8 Seasons

New York (AP)—University of Oklahoma football teams have gained more than 130 miles by running in the last eight seasons. This year, for the first time, the Sooners may win the national major college rushing title.

Figures released by the NCAA Service Bureau Wednesday showed the Sooners not only a mere two yards behind Cincinnati in the race for ball carrying honors with one game left for each, but disclosed an unmatched sustained performance since 1946.

In that span, opened by Coach Jim Tatum the first year and continued by Bud Wilkinson ever since, Oklahoma has the best winning percentage in the country, the highest rushing yards total and has been among the top 10 rushing teams each year, placing second in 1949 and 1952.

This year's figures are 2,759 yards for Cincinnati, an average of 306.6 yards a game, and 2,757 for Oklahoma, or 306.3.

That makes an eight year total of 22,889 yards rushing for the Sooners, or 289.7 a game.

In total offense, Cincinnati holds a comfortable margin over Texas Tech, 422.6 yards a game to 280.9, and in scoring the positions are reversed but the margin is smaller, Texas Tech averaging 38.2 points a game to Cincinnati's 37.8. West Virginia has tallied 32.2 a game, perfect record Maryland 29.8 and unbeaten but tied Notre Dame 28.6.

The passing title is sure to go to a Pacific Coast team, but Stanford, the leader is in a fine spot to have the end of its season marred by the same crowd that spoiled its beginning, College of Pacific.

Stanford is through for the year with 179.5 yards a game by passing. College of Pacific which upset the Indians in the season opener, has 174.9 and a game with Utah State coming up Thursday. No one else is close. Washington is 10th at 136.9.
