Water Problem Meeting Dated

Dallas—The purpose of the governor's water resource committee will be explained at a meeting sponsored by the Polk county Pomona Grange Thursday, Dec. 8, at 8 p.m. at the Ricketts, grange hall, G. C. Brown Pomona grange, agricultural chairman, and N. John Hansen, county extension agent have developed plans for a county-wide meeting open to the general public for this purpose.

Ken Sawyer, agricultural representative of the Portland chamber of commerce and a member of the governor's water resources committee, will explain the work of the committee as defined by an act of the last legislature. The committee has been set up to investigate the water situation of Oregon and develop bills that may be submitted to next legislature in regard to controlling the water resources of Oregon.

Of particular importance to this area, Hansen stated, is the possibility of an act which will provide for water rights on irrigation wells west of the Cascade mountains as now exists in eastern Oregon.

J. C. Moore, conservation specialist, Oregon state college, will discuss the topic, "What the people of Polk county can do to assist the water resources committee during this interim study period."

Hansen emphasized that this is a meeting sponsored by the grange, but is open to all persons in Polk county and urges an attendance by all those interested in water development.
