Paris (AP) — A U. S. Air Force C119 Flying Boxcar from Donaldson Base at Greenville, S. C., crashed near Orly Field just outside Paris Friday killing all five occupants.

The plane had flown from Greenville via the Azores on a ferrying mission en route to the Rhine-Main base near Frankfurt, Germany. Air Force officers at Orly Field said.

Those aboard included the pilot, co-pilot, radio operator, engineer and navigator. All five bodies were recovered.
