Maryland Ears Final No. 1 AP Grid Rating

New York (AP) — Maryland, the only college football team to go through a major schedule without a defeat or a tie, won the 1953 national collegiate football championship from undefeated but once-tied Notre Dame. Maryland, winner of 10 games and headed for a New Year's day engagement with Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl, earned the coveted O'Donnell trophy. The O'Donnell trophy, donated by the Notre Dame program club in honor of the late Rev. Hugh O'Donnell, former Notre Dame football player who became president of that institution, is awarded annually as a national championship emblem on the basis of the Associated Press poll. Maryland succeeds Michigan State as holder of the trophy, which will be awarded outright to the first team to win it three times. The final 1953 poll brought out a record number of 378 votes. In the showdown vote, Maryland received 187 first place ballots and 3365 points to 141 firsts and 3149 points for Notre Dame. Michigan State, last year's champion which lost 1 of 9 games this year en route to a tie for the Big Ten championship in its first year of conference play, finished third with
