Blue Cheese Dip
Pretzel Sticks

Blue Cheese Dip
Ingredients: 1/4 pound blue cheese, 2 tablespoons chili sauce, 2 to 3 teaspoons finely grated onion (pulp and juice), 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 cup (about) mayonnaise or mayonnaise-type dressing.
Method: Have blue cheese at room temperature; mash with a spoon or fork, and stir in chili sauce, onion, parsley, and Worcestershire sauce. Gradually stir in mayonnaise until mixture is of dunking consistency. (If you want a smoother mixture, force it through a fine sieve.) Refrigerate in covered container until serving time.
