Mill City Asks For Gym Bids

Mill City—Bids will be opened at 8 p.m., December 22, for an elementary school gymnasium here. Plans, as prepared by Anand, Boone & Leal, architects, are for a 101 by 130-foot reinforced concrete building. Wood trusses will be used under built-up roofing. An adjacent boiler room will measure 32 by 26 feet. Another area, to measure 60 by 32 feet, will contain snack bar, laundry and toilets. Shower room floors and walls and toilet floors will be ceramic tile. Cement block walls are to be used in some places. Concrete floors are to be laid in the locker rooms. The gym floor will be maple. The gym floor will be 90 by 100 feet. A balcony area above the locker room section will measure 40 by 100 feet and will be used for various athletic activities. Exterior walls are to be painted concrete. Equipment is to be furnished by the district.
