One of the best entertainment programs they have enjoyed in Washington was commented on by Secretary and Mrs. Douglas McKay following the B'nai B'rith "Dinner with the President." Among the top flight artists participating were Helen Hayes, Rex Harrison and Lilli Palmer, the latter two serving as joint master and mistress of ceremonies. Ethel Merman, William Warfield, Eddie Fisher, Lucille Ball and Desi Arnez, and Jane Froman, Jackie Robinson, of baseball fame, was introduced and was asked if his race proved any handicap in his career. He replied that all any club asked now was "can a man play ball?" and problems of earlier days had all been forgotten. When Lucille Ball in chatting with Mrs. McKay signed the latter's program, she wrote, "Love, Lucy," a reminder of her TV show.

On the same evening, the Charles Lawton program of readings at the Library of Congress resulted in a jam-packed auditorium, with many turned away. His facility in creating the illusion of reality in setting the scene and developing the characters of the story is well known but one marvels anew each time he is heard at the power he has to make one appreciate more fully the beauty and strength of words.
