

Church Elects Wayne Greene

The congregation of the First Christian church Sunday voted at the close of the morning worship service to extend a call to Wayne Greene of Beatrice, Nebr., to become minister of the church.

A telegram was sent to Rev. Greene by the local church board informing him of the action.

Rev. Greene, who has been pastor of the Beatrice church for the past 12 years, will succeed Dudley Strain, who recently went to Lubbock, Texas.

The pulp committee of the First Christian church met with Rev. Greene early last week. The committee expressed satisfaction over the Nebraska minister's qualifications and then called a meeting of the official church board. Sunday's vote was the final step in the selection of the new minister.

Rev. Greene is 48 years old and a graduate of Drake university. Mrs. Greene also is a Drake graduate. The Greens who are missionary minded, have built the membership of the Beatrice church to about 1400, which is about one tenth of the population of Beatrice. There are 22 other churches in Beatrice.

The Greens have two children—a son who is a sophomore at Drake and a daughter who is married to a ministerial student.

Donald Payne, associate pastor under Dudley Strain, has been filling the local pulpit on an interim basis since Strain's departure.

John Hartley Rites Monday

John William Hartley, 81, of 1895 Lancaster Dr. died at his home Dec. 4, after several months' illness.

He was one of 10 children born to John and Elizabeth Hartley at Fostoria, Ohio. He was born Nov. 9, 1872 and lived near Fostoria until 1895 when he went to Iowa to make his living as a farmer.

He farmed there with the exception of two years when he lived at Hastings, Neb., until 1918 when he retired to an acreage at Earlham, Iowa.

In 1935 he came to Salem, buying an acreage at the corner of Lancaster Dr. and Sunnyview avenue where he built a new home and has lived there until his death.

He is survived by his wife, Goldie C. Hartley, to whom he was married in 1925, and four sons, Harold V. Hartley of Brighton, Colo.; William L. Hartley, Denver, Colo.; Norris M. Hartley of Santa Ana, Calif.; John Warren Hartley of San Francisco, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. Mabel Williams, Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Ruth Shaw of San Diego, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Jennie Darrin and Mrs. Ada Zuber of Fostoria, Ohio; one brother, Arvie Hartley, Hamilton, Wis.; 10 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren with many nieces and nephews.

He was a member of the Christian church but attended services regularly at the First Presbyterian church.

Rev. B. J. Holland will officiate at funeral services at 2 p. m. Monday in Clough Barrick chapel. Interment will be at Earlham, Iowa.

Mrs. Landon was born in Wisconsin, Mar. 10, 1859. She married J. R. Landon at Bloomfield, Wis., Feb. 6, 1878. They lived in Iowa for two years, then moved to Parker's Prairie, Minn., where they lived for 14 years.

The Landons moved to Oregon in 1895, living in Silverton three years and came to Woodburn in 1898. Mr. Landon owned a furniture business in Woodburn for 25 years.

Surviving are a son, George A. Landon, and a granddaughter, Mrs. John (Marcelle) Carson, both of Woodburn. A daughter, Mrs. Edith Love, preceded Mrs. Landon in death. Mrs. Landon was active in the Methodist church and the WCTU until illness forced her retirement a year ago.

The group adopted a resolution opposing proposed lowering of parity and support prices on wheat. It also urged construction of more grain elevators and use of laid-up Liberty ships to store surplus wheat. Continued payment by the government for conservation practices was favored.
