Cobat Seated At Sweet Home

Sweet Home—Blaine Cobat was appointed by Sweet Home City Councilmen to serve the unexpired term of the late Harold Mellinger at a meeting this week.

Mellinger's term expires in 1956. Cobat is a partner in the South Fork Lumber Company and has lived in Sweet Home for seven years.

Other business on the agenda during the meeting included the order of the council for City Manager Jess Parker to call for bids for the construction of the new city hall and fire hall addition. Bids are to be opened Jan. 12, 1954.

A letter from the State Speed Control Board was read and was rejected by the councilmen. It included a plan for revision of designated speed zones on M street. Police Chief Roy Clover offered an alternate plan which was approved by the council and it will be submitted to the State Speed Control Board.

Clover's plan calls for designated speeds of 35 m.p.h. from the west city limits to Ames creek; 25 m.p.h. to 18th Ave., and 35 m.p.h. from 18th Ave. to city limits.

C. V. Patterson and High school superintendent, Harold Dishaw, representing the city recreation council gave a report of the 1953 summer activities.

A. B. Berns, O. M. Lewis, Art Sherman, Dale Weeks, and Raleigh Middleton were appointed as viewers for three new sewer improvement districts. The districts are between 3rd and 4th Aves., south of I St., in the Crabtree addition and between 4th and 5th avenues south of I St.

The council passed for first and second reading an ordinance that amends the insurance section of Sweet Home's ordinance. It now requires TV installers to carry liability insurance covering only the period of installation.

The viewers report for Street Improvement district No. 12 was passed for second reading. An ordinance authorizing a \$40,000 issue of Bancroft bonds for completed street and sewer improvements was also passed for second reading.

Passed for third and final reading was a regulatory ordinance for the flying of model aircraft that prohibits the use of electrically-conducting control lines.

The council endorses license applications submitted by the Bohemian club for beer and wine licenses and by the Town Club and Lee's Pastime for beer license.

Mrs. Bright Passes Away

Mrs. Mildred L. Bright, the mother of Mrs. Richard D. Slater of Salem, died in a Portland hospital Saturday, following a brief illness. She had lived in Salem for several years before going to Portland four years ago.

Mrs. Bright was the widow of the late C. J. Bright, an attorney of The Dalles, Oregon, where she made her home before coming to Salem. She was active in church, civic and musical organizations there and was organist of the First Methodist Church of that city for many years.

She is survived by two daughters, a sister and six grandchildren and one great-grandson.

Services will be held at the Colonial Mortuary, East 14th and Sandy Boulevard, Portland, Tuesday at 10 a. m. followed by interment in the family plot at The Dalles.

Scio, Ore. (AP)—Dr. Jacob Frederick Hosch, 73, a Democratic representative to the State Legislature from 1935 to 1943, died at his ranch here Saturday.

He purchased the 400-acre show-place ranch in 1945 when he retired, after practicing medicine 40 years.

Before going to the Legislature from Deschutes county, Dr. Hosch was mayor of Bend for three years.

Before going to Bend in 1924 he practiced 14 years in Redmond. He retired after practicing during World War II at Albany.
