Injuries Fatal To Lee Jacobs

Baker, Ore. (AP)—Lee Jacobs, 65, prominent figure in Oregon radio broadcasting, died here Tuesday morning of injuries suffered in a Sunday highway accident.

Jacobs, president of the Inland Radio Corporation which operates radio stations at the Eastern Oregon cities of Baker, Ontario and LaGrande, succumbed to what apparently was a lung congestion. He was a director of the National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters and was traveling alone to attend a meeting of the Idaho Broadcasters Association in Twin Falls when his car skidded on ice and overturned.

Jacobs came here in 1944 from Klamath Falls where he had been in the wholesale grocery business. He served two terms as president of the Oregon State Broadcasters Association.

The widow and a daughter, Mrs. Kenneth Lockwood of Baker, survive.

Wool Growers' Plan Suggested

Long Beach, Calif. (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson said today "we clearly need a new wool program" and warned that any increase in wool tariffs would "seriously impair" U. S. foreign relations.

He indicated that a system of cash payments to producers, possibly financed by existing tariffs, has received most favorable reaction as a solution to the wool price support problem. The payments would be made to farmer: whenever domestic wool prices dropped below a predetermined level.

However, he said "rumors" that the department already has decided on a wool program are "wholly false."

In a speech prepared for delivery before the annual convention of the National Wool Growers Association, Benson said the recommendations adopted at the convention "will not only be welcome, but will be a necessary part of the final job."
