Hop Crop Down 11 Million Lbs.

The world's 1953 hop crop is down about 11,000,000 pounds as compared with that of 1952, according to estimates of the U. S. department of agriculture's foreign agricultural service.

The world yield for 1953 is placed at 132 million pounds, of which the United States is credited with 41,752,000. A year ago this country produced 53,239,000 pounds.

The reduction is due mainly

The reduction is due mainly to the smaller crops harvested in the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom and Japan: A substantially lower crops is indicated also for Australia.

On the other hand larger

crops than a year ago are re-ported for Germany, Czecho-slovakia, Belgium, France,

Spain and Yugoslavia. The in-creases, the report points out, are especially significant from the point of view of the com-petition which American ex-porteds must meet in foreign markets during the current selling essayon.






