

### Soil Group to Chart Program

Mt. Angel — Preliminary plans for the first annual meeting of the Mount Angel Soil Conservation District to be held in Mount Angel around Jan. 15 were made at the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the Mount Angel Soil Conservation District held Friday evening, Dec. 4, at the district office in Mount Angel.

Chairman Jim Jackson presided at the meeting. It was decided that the office hours for the Mount Angel office will be 8 to 9 a.m. Monday through Friday. Anyone wishing to call at the office should do so at this time. Phone calls can be made at this time. The phone number for this office is Mount Angel, Red 73.

The office personnel will spend most of its time in the field, which is the reason for restricted office hours.

A number of requests for assistance were reviewed. All of the requests were approved. Truman Maases reported that he has made a soil survey of 3100 acres in the district. A great part of this was made in the Hoffman flats west of Mount Angel.

A chart guide was set up as a general conservation guide for the individual soil capability maps being made up for the land owners in the Mount Angel district.

Soil sample cartons will be available in the Mount Angel office for those wishing a soil fertility test made. These tests are necessary for those wishing assistance in the P.M. A. lime program.

### Ban Shipments Of Cull Potatoes

Portland (AP) — Shipment of cull potatoes from producing areas has been banned by the Oregon-California marketing agreement committee, Merrill Webb, committee manager, reported Monday.

Producing areas affected by the ban include Jefferson, Crook, Deschutes, Lake and Klamath counties in Oregon and Siskiyou and Modoc counties in California.

Webb said that the order resulted from discovery that cull potatoes shipped for livestock feed had been diverted to other markets.

### Execution Stay For Polygamists

Kingman, Ariz. (AP) — A judge's angry words echoed for a lonely group of men who headed home Tuesday—to empty Short Creek, a town with echoes of its own.

The 28 leaders of the uprooted polygamy colony were given a "stay of execution" after pleading guilty to charges of conspiracy.

Imposition of sentence was suspended until Dec. 1, 1954, by Superior Court Judge Robert A. Tullar with this stern warning:

A violation by any of you and the individual will be sentenced to prison.

Legal wives will be permitted to join their husbands at Short Creek. But polygamous wives will not, on threat of legal action by the state. All of their children now are forbidden from returning. State's attorneys indicated a way might be found to keep the children with their mothers, however.
